The three Central Oregon basketball league leaders came through to win games last week. The leading Redmond club, only team to beat the Legion team so far, stayed on top by winning from Powell Butte, 38-25 and Sisters, 54-14.

The Bend Legion team remained in second place by downing the Wooden Box men 48 to 30 and then going to Madras for a 64-48 win over the Jefferson county club.

Prineville maintained its third place rating and stayed in as a top league contender by shooting its way to a pair of victories over Sisters 53-28 and over Wooden Box 49-28.

Indians Defeated
Powell Butte trounced the Warm Springs quintet Thursday night at Powell Butte 41 to 21. The Powell Butte five is one of the most rapidly improving club in the circuit and may be pushing the leaders shortly.

Madras has developed a high scoring combination which was able to run up 48 points against the strong Legion team. Sisters is strengthening rapidly and will be able to hold its own in the second round. The Warm Springs Indians are lacking in height, which is a big item with each of the other clubs possessing big men to work under the baskets.

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Stanford Splits Uclan Contests

Stanford, slated to meet the top-touted California Bears next Friday and Saturday, filled pre-season dope sheets with question marks over the week end by splitting a brace of games with the powerful UCLA Bruins.

The Indians, rated well under UCLA, surprised the experts by winning Friday night's encounter 38 to 33, then nearly duplicated the feat on Saturday. Only a scoring rampage by Milo Stanich during the second half permitted the Bruins to pull out of the hole and win 48 to 40.

California's Bears triumphed over USC on those same two nights by virtue of deadly accuracy from the foul line. During the two games they sank 31 out of a possible 51 free throws to win Friday's game 42 to 38 and Saturday's 53 to 47.

In other games Saturday night, Oregon State, northern division leader, squeezed by Oregon, 73 to 69, after an overtime period and Washington State trounced Idaho, 36 to 28.

Staters Win In Overtime Game

Corvallis, Ore., Jan. 13 (AP) — Oregon State college basketball team today was installed as the club to watch in the northern division Pacific Coast conference championship race.

The Orangemen protected their undefeated conference play record here Saturday night by edging a slightly-favored University of Oregon quintet, 73 to 69, in a torrid, overtime period.

A capacity crowd of 2800 persons saw the game go at full speed through the regular play, which ended at 62-all, and then go into a fireworks finish that saw 18 points scored in the five-minute overtime period.

Score Tied

With the score tied at the close of the regular game, Morris Silver, Oregon State guard, dropped in a quick field goal. Stan Williamson, Oregon guard, replied in kind.

Silver tossed in another and again Williamson matched him, bringing the score to 69-all. Then OSC forward Al Peterson came through with a field goal, was fouled in the effort and made good the free throw to end the scoring.

Oregon was ahead early in the first half, 17 to 10, and ended the session in front, 34 to 30. OSC scored 10 points at the start of the second half to go ahead 40 to 34. Oregon closed the gap and it was dog-eat-dog from then on.

Ken Hays of Oregon was high point man with 17. Lew Beck of OSC and Williamson of Oregon each had 16.

New York, Jan. 13 (AP) — The U.S. Golf association hauled off today and in its most austere manner criticized various sections of the nation for slipshod amateurism, gambling and making the game too easy.

How anybody can make golf easy for a man with a hook, a slice or short wood shots is hard to conceive but the governing body of amateur golf made it clear that certain depredations must cease in connection with the royal and ancient game.

Nothing was said about using hard, comforting words after shanking a shot or the backroom business of padding your handicap. But New York's metropolitan area was frowned upon for using a profitable little gimmick known as the Calcutta pool.

Manhattan has had enough troubles along these lines, what with its basketball and football betting scandals. There was no hint from the fairway fathers that any such staggering calamity was expected but in firm, black type they announced:

"Calcutta pools are entirely too large and should be discouraged."

Salt Lake City, Utah, also was admonished by the tyros of the Simon pure tree. Somebody apparently has dropped a hint that in the vicinity of the town the saline water they are not above giving an amateur a bit more than the purity laws allow—and maybe even money.

There is a tendency to ignore the amateur spirit regarding

U.S.G.A. regulations for prizes." The sectional affairs committee intoned, adding the squelching line that in the Utah metropolis "there is too much ball-lifting on the green."

Personally, I don't mind people giving away their own money but it goes against the grain to have anybody lift my ball after I finally get it on the carpet. That's even tougher work than making money.

Birmingham, Ala., was chided for its "alarming trend toward non-observance of the rules of golf." All of which means that they henceforth must give up the pleasures of using winter rules all summer and teeing up in the rough.

The male population of Cincinnati probably knows it by now, in a digestive sort of way, but the U.S.G.A. reports there are "more women players" in that fair city. Just another way of saying "golf widowers" and wouldn't it be nice if they went back to bridge. At least they'd be home when you get there.

Cincinnati also is among those cities which are commended for devoting more time and interest to the younger players. Among those in this class are Chicago, Baltimore, Albuquerque, N.M., and Minneapolis. There isn't much doubt that golf is better for them than trolley-car hopping, hooky and snooker pool.

Throughout the nation, the parent body observes, attempts are being made to rehabilitate courses, build new ones and generally improve playing conditions. The official nod of recognition for such efforts was awarded Phoenix, Ariz., Washington, D.C., Louisville, Ky., St. Louis, Buffalo, Syracuse and Glen Falls, N.Y.; Portland, Ore., Philadelphia and Fort Worth, Tex.

But up in Utica, N.Y., they're sissies. The Uticans are charged with a "tendency to make courses easier and shorter and generally to keep the rough out quite short." No, the U.S.G.A. doesn't like that, but as for me, brother: See you in Utica!

Portland Icemen Strengthen Lead

The Portland Eagles strengthened their hold on the northern division leadership in the Pacific Coast Ice Hockey league last night by defeating the Vancouver Canucks, 11 to 6, for a new seasonal high scoring record.

Bears, Panthers Clash On Tuesday

One of the big games of the season for the Bend Lava Bears will come tomorrow night when the hard-driving quintet goes to Redmond to test its strength against the highly-rated Panther five.

At the opening of the season, Redmond was considered a strong contender for Central Oregon honors this year. Since that time the Panthers have played a schedule that has taken them over much of Oregon, including the three-day invitation tournament at The Dalles. This past week end they were at Hood River, where they played two games with the Blue Dragons, who are nearly as strong at basketball as they were at football.

Hancock Is Coach

The Panthers are now under the tutelage of a new coach, Hugh V. (Red) Hancock, who arrived last week to replace Gene Langley. Langley went out of the coaching business and moved to Grants Pass to manage a men's clothing store.

Hancock is expected to make few changes in the Panthers' style of play immediately, but will shift the team over gradually from the Langley style to his own.

The Bears hit a near-peak performance Friday night when they dumped Springfield 61 to 46. The margin was not quite as wide as the score indicated as the two teams had been tied 44-44 with a little over four minutes left to play. After that time the Bears opened up with their fast break and left the Millers far behind.

One Quarter Bad

Even though they won, the Bears had a bad third quarter which saw Springfield wipe out a 10-point lead.

Tomorrow night's game will be one of the big tests for both teams this year. Three teams — Bend, Redmond and Prineville — are rated high for district honors. Bend defeated Prineville last week and a victory over Redmond tomorrow night would add to the Bear stock considerably. Redmond, on the other hand, needs a victory over Bend to live up to pre-season predictions that the Panthers were coming up with a state tournament team this year.
