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Rent Control Data Outlined In Booklet

A small booklet covering points of interest to tenants and landlords has been made available at the local rent control office, it was announced today.

The book is called "Some Answers to Questions About OPA Rent Control," and may be had without charge. "The booklet will be helpful not only to persons who have specific rent problems, but also to all tenants and landlords," according to Jackson T. Moore, area rent director.

Among subjects covered are: Which rents are subject to rent control; circumstances under which a landlord may get a rent increase; how a tenant knows what the legal rent ceiling is; conditions under which OPA may reduce rents; protection of tenants against eviction.

Visit To Tropical Jungles Described By Robert Arnold

A vacation trip spent in the tropical jungles and rugged mountain country in northern Australia is described by Robert C. Arnold, American vice consul with the diplomatic corps stationed at Sydney, in a recent letter to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. F. Arnold, of Bend.

Highlights of the trip, which started by plane from Sydney to Townsville, with an over-night stop at Brisbane, were a boat trip to Magnetic island, and a motor trip inland from the Atherton tablelands, stopping at the large mountain lakes to swim, in the jungle to eat bananas and mangos.

After returning to Cairns, he took a plane back to Townsville and enjoyed a two-day fishing trip to the islands of the Outer Barrier reef. His description, in part, follows:

"We (three of us) had an 18-foot launch, which we slept in at night, anchored in Alligator

creek, where we were drenched a couple of times with the tropical rains. We could see plenty of alligators in the day and hear them all night. At dusk the sky would be black with flying foxes and there were loads of tremendous turtles on the beaches. . . . The next day I visited some of the other islands on the reef."
