

Panthers, Bears Ready For Battle On Redmond Floor

Redmond and Bend high school basketball teams, two of the top contenders for district honors and a trip to the state tournament at Eugene, will undergo a pre-tournament test of strength when they meet in an extra game at Redmond tonight.

So far this season the Bears have scored two close victories over the Panthers, but in neither case was the margin sufficient to make the Lava Bears a certain favorite for the district title.

Tonight's game will give the Bend five a chance to become familiar with the larger Redmond floor, on which tournament games will be played next week end and will also give Redmond a chance to plan a little strategy against the Bend team in case the two clubs should be finalists at the playoffs next Saturday night.

Big Crowd Expected

A large crowd from Bend will attend the Redmond game tonight. One hundred general admission tickets were sent here early in the week and 150 Bend students have received tickets.

Coach Claude Cook expects to start Jerry Toole, Phil Gillis, Bill Sheffield, Dick Maudlin or either Babe Maudlin or Jack Gillilan.

Redmond is one of the closest checking teams that Bend has played this year and has managed to throw the Bears' fast break into low gear on most occasions. The Panther five has seldom allowed any of its opponents to score over 40 points this year. The past week end they turned in victories over John Day and Burns, the latter game completing their Central Oregon schedule with a record of eight wins and two losses.

Don Fawcett Coming

Don Fawcett, popular Portland official, will handle the floor work for tonight's game. Fawcett is to be one of the officials at the tournament games next week end.

The Bend Cubs and the Redmond Kittens, second teams of the two schools, will also meet tonight in a game that will decide the winner of a three-game series this season. So far each of the clubs has turned in a victory.
