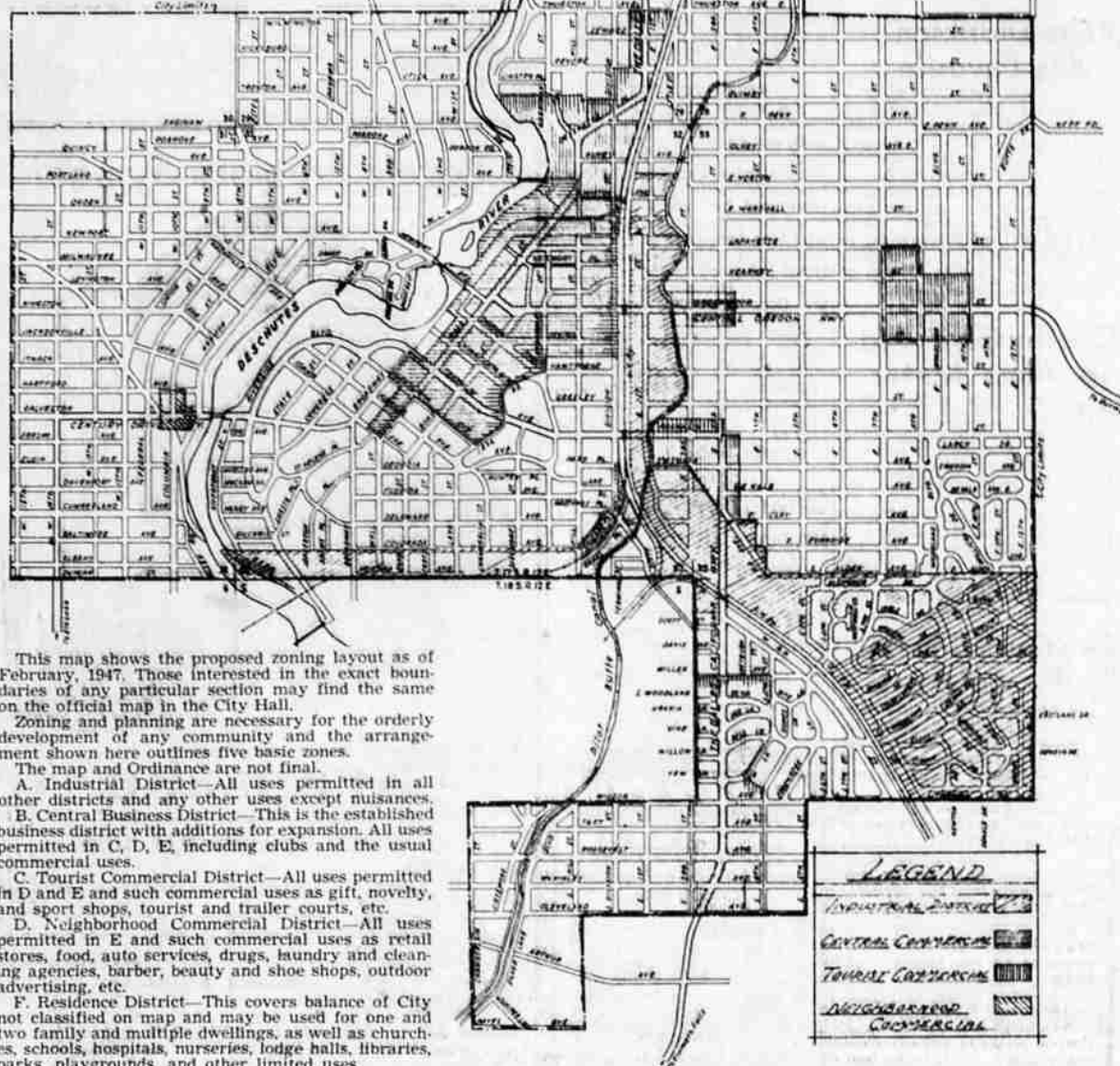

PROPOSED ZONING MAP
CITY OF BEND
FEBRUARY
1947



This map shows the proposed zoning layout as of February, 1947. Those interested in the exact boundaries of any particular section may find the same on the official map in the City Hall.
Zoning and planning are necessary for the orderly development of any community and the arrangement shown here outlines five basic zones.

T. H. McGREER, PIONEER
The trails of Chief Paulina and his raiders were still fresh in the sparsely populated interior region of Oregon many years ago when a young stockman, T. H. McGreer, settled on the green ridges that overlook the deep John Day valley from the south, in the colored hills of the Clarno basin. That was 65 years ago. Bend's present site was marked by a few cabins. Redmond was not even a dot on the map of Oregon, and Prineville, the village of Barney Prine near the junction of Crooked river and Ochoco creek, was just taking its place in the sun as the county seat of Crook, created from Wasco in 1882.

WASHINGTON COLUMN

Washington, D.C. (NEA) — It may be too early yet to make a fair appraisal on how congressional reorganization is working out. But in the first six weeks of the session, all has not been hunky-dory.
Congressman Mike Monroney of Oklahoma, co-sponsor with ex-Sen. Bob LaFollette on the reorganization bill, says there has been less open opposition than anticipated. Undercover, it's something else.

There is no quarrel with the congressional leaders. They have supported streamlining to perfection. The republican leadership in the house has given the lower chamber a strong rules committee under Leo Allen of Illinois. It is no longer the legislative bottleneck it formerly was. The all-powerful rules committee was one of the sacred things the LaFollette-Monroney committee was forbidden to reform.
But since the republicans themselves have voluntarily taken the lead in changing the policy for this traditionally dietatorial group, there is that much unexpected net gain on top of other reforms.
