

Public Hearing On Road Access Measure Is Held

Salem, Ore., Feb. 21 (AP)—Pros and cons of the disjunctive throughways bill (SB 121) were presented to the joint roads and highways committee of the Oregon legislature last night at a public hearing attended by so many persons it had to be conducted in the house chamber.

Approximately 400 packed the gallery and floor but anticipated demonstration by the spectators was limited to applause.

Bill Opposed
L. R. Rostel, Milwaukie, representing the state auto court association and the Milwaukie and Oregon City chambers of commerce, said his groups were against the bill the way it is written, but were not closed to compromise.

He suggested an amendment that would allow establishment of limited access highways between congested areas, but objected to legislation that might force persons along roadways out of business.

Horace Dryer, Portland, speaking for the measure said it is misunderstood.

William Tugman, editor of The Eugene Register-Guard, told the committee that thoroughways are needed to reduce traffic accidents. He said the highways are "cluttered" with business establishments that are located in such a manner they are traffic hazards.

Virgil Langtre, Eugene, said the League of Oregon Cities, which he represented, did not object to the bill.

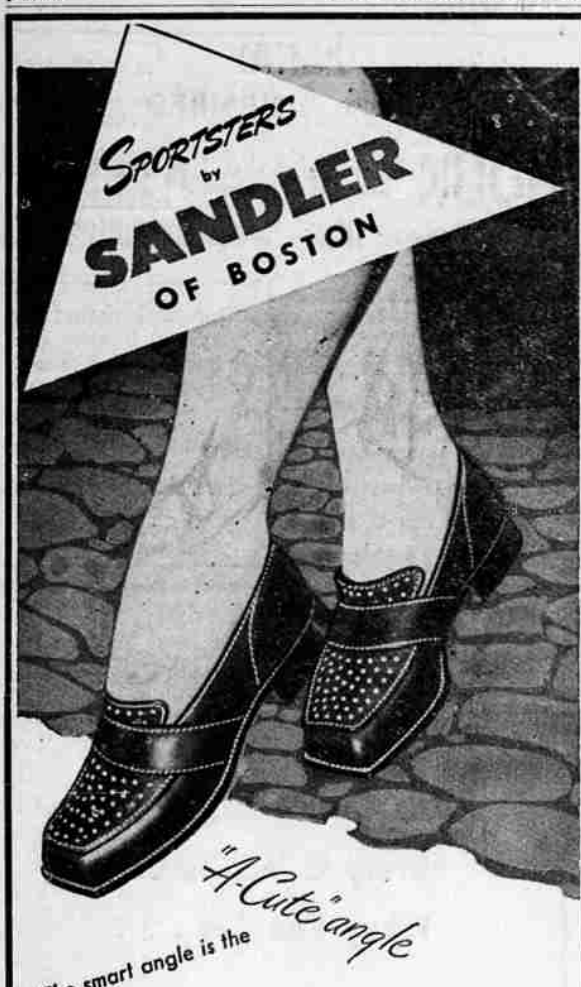
Private Airplane Reported Missing

McChord Field, Wash., Feb. 21 (AP)—Air rescue service planes today started a search for a four-passenger private plane which has been missing since Sunday on a flight from Red Bluff, Calif., to Beaverton, Ore.

Maj. Frank Raser, rescue unit commander, described the plane as a single-engine, all-metal ship, piloted by a man identified only as "Mr. Locke." The presence of other passengers aboard was not known.

The blue-trimmed ship took off from Red Bluff without filing a flight plan. As a consequence it was not reported missing until Locke's employer became alarmed at his four-day absence from work.

Army rescue units and the Portland wing of the civil air patrol will join in the search, Raser reported.

Soviets To 'Look' Into U. S. Debt

Washington, Feb. 21 (AP)—Russia, after a year of enigmatic silence, finally has agreed to "look into" the question of squaring her \$11,298,000,000 lend-lease bill. It was learned today.

This first hint that the bill would get any study at all was received here following recent conferences in Moscow between U. S. ambassador Walter Bedell Smith and Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov.

State department and lend-lease officials emphasized, however, that they still was no assurance the Soviets were ready to sit down and square their account. The answers received by Smith were said to be brief and non-committal—simply to the effect that Russia "Would look into the matter."

Six Attempts Made
The United States, it was learned, has made a total of six attempts within the past year to get Russia to begin initial discussions looking toward a lend-lease settlement. Only Smith's personal conferences prompted a reply.

Great Britain, France, Belgium, Turkey, Australia, New Zealand settled their lend-lease obligations more than six months ago.

"I'm going in the bedroom," Joey told Ellen and Norma Jean. "When I knock you can come in."

They waited, but there was no knock. Pushing into the bedroom they found Joey, hanging by his neck, his body dangling at the end of the old rope leash.

Millions Sought In Vets' Bonus

State lawmakers have proposed the payment of veterans' bonuses totalling several hundred million dollars, a survey showed today.

In some states however passage of the bonus laws may be deferred, and in still others the methods of financing the bonus must be approved by the voters.

In general, the bonus proposals would provide for payment of specific sums to veterans on the basis of the time they spent in service, with larger payments for time spent overseas.

Bonus bills have been submitted in the state legislatures of Michigan, Texas, Missouri, Oklahoma, Nebraska, Minnesota, Nevada, New Jersey, Colorado, Iowa, Wisconsin, Pennsylvania, South Dakota, Indiana and Connecticut.

Illinois already has passed a soldier's bonus, and payments are scheduled to begin next summer.
