

# Navy, Wisconsin Drop From Play; Easterners Win

New York, March 21 (UP)—City College of New York and Holy Cross, both speed teams, survived today for the eastern regional NCAA basketball championship game Saturday night.

Both won with speed in semi-final games at Madison Square garden last night, with Holy Cross topping Navy 55 to 47, before CCNY dumped Wisconsin, 70 to 56, with a tremendous last-minute drive that made up a 10-point deficit.

**Victory Spectacular**  
CCNY's victory was a spectacular and memorable display and stole attention from the business-like methods by which Holy Cross defeated a navy team that had lost only once in 17 previous starts. The Beavers, hampered by loss of their big forward Mason Benson, bedded with grippe, were almost chased off the court as they started slowly against the Big Nine champions.

Wisconsin controlled the backboards, and missed few shots. The Beavers led at 12 to 2, then at 15 to 3 before CCNY got its first field goal at six minutes. But CCNY didn't crack, and Irwin Dambrot, Sunny Jameson and Lionel Malamed slowly closed the gap. At the half it was 37 to 27 for Wisconsin, and in the first five minutes of the second half CCNY moved into a tie.

**Pace Too Fast**  
The run-and-shoot Beavers played an even tempo for the next three minutes as the lead changed hands continuously. Then the pace began to tell on Wisconsin, and CCNY ran wild, increasing its lead until the end. Dambrot, a big center, led the Beavers with 16 points. Exner Menzel, a smooth ballhandler and fine shooter, was best for Wisconsin with 15 points and Bob Cook, leading scorer in the Big Nine, had 13 points, one more than Cien Selbo.

Navy and Holy Cross played a wearing first half in which the lead changed hands six times and the score was tied twice. Holy Cross led at the half, 29 to 27, and Navy took the lead at 30 to 29 shortly after the second half started. But Navy began to tire, and when George Kaftan put Holy Cross back in the lead at 31 to 30, it was the last time the lead changed hands.

The eastern champion will play the western regional champion, who will be named at Kansas City tonight and tomorrow night, for the NCAA national title in a game at Madison Square garden next Tuesday night.

The Portland Eagles had a 2 to 1 series lead in their final northern division playoff round today with the Seattle Ironmen, and Seattle's goalie was in the hospital with a cut over the eye which further endangered their chances of going to the Pacific coast hockey league title match.

Nelson Little was injured in the third period last night as Portland scored a 3 to 2 triumph. Defenseman Bob Drainville took over the net guarding job. Seattle came from behind in both the first and second frames to tie the score but never matched the decisive third period marker by Portland. The series goes to the winner of four out of seven.

## Top-Seeded Fives Leading Tourney

Denver, March 21 (UP)—The top seeded combination of Bartlesville, Okla., and Oakland, Calif., still dominated the national AAU tournament as it reached the semi-finals today.

Bartlesville meets Seattle and Oakland tackles the Denver Nuggets tonight, with the winners moving into the title clash tomorrow.

Both Bartlesville and Oakland moved to easy victories in quarter-final games last night. Bartlesville literally walked over Golden, Colo., 66-26, and Oakland bounced off the tournament's best non-seeded team, Southern Methodist University of Dallas, 74-42.

**Attack Repelled**  
Seattle, the dark-horse sensation of the tournament, had to repel a late rally to win. Los Angeles nearly did the trick before they buckled, 34-31, in the final moments of play.

Seattle had grabbed an early lead and was ahead 15-8 after a low-scoring first half. Things got hot in the last two periods, however, the score was tied three times and the lead changed hands four times. But Roy Williamson's two fielders in the last four minutes of play gave Seattle the victory.

## Cowboys Start Track Practice

Prineville, March 21 (Special)—With basketball season out of the way the Crook county Cowboys have settled down to the job of forming a winning track team under the direction of Coach Marlon Huff.

Indications are that Huff will have a tough job on his hands this year in building a winning cinder team as only two lettermen, Bill McCormack, weight man, and J. C. McPhetridge, sprinter, are on hand from last year's team.

With the first call for practice only five men turned out and this gave Huff little help in the big task of filling the shoes of Dallas Chalfant, state 440-yard dash champion; Bill Hartman, district 220-yard titlist, and Herb Henry, speedy hurdler and discus thrower.

The first meet has been scheduled for March 28 when the Cowboys will come up against Bend and Redmond in a three-way meet at Redmond.

## Young Lieutenant Held Murdered

Plymouth, Mass., March 21 (UP)—Lt. Robert L. Wilson, 23, of Plymouth, whose body was found in a Tokyo hotel room beside that of a pretty Japanese girl, was murdered because of the love-frenzy of a "modern Madam Butterfly," the youth's mother said here today.

Mrs. George Wilson, appealing for an army investigation, said she believed her filer-son was poisoned on the eve of his departure from Japan because the native girl who joined him in death did not want him reunited with his American fiancée.

## Mexicans Drop 10 Big Leaguers

Mexico City, March 21 (UP)—Cuban and Mexican players said today they believed that disputes over money caused the Mexican league to drop the names of 10 ex-major leaguers from team rosters for 1947.

Members of the Mexico City and Vera Cruz teams, training at Delta Park here, said they understood that some of the former big leaguers were asking raises and others, whose 1946 seasons were poor, were objecting to cuts.

The unlisted players are Max Lanier, Lou Klein and Fred Martin, former Cardinals; Danny Gardella, Roy Zimmerman, Ace Adams, Harry Feldman and George Hausmann from the New York Giants; Murray Franklin from the Detroit Tigers and ex-Chicago Cub Chico Hernandez. Ten other former U.S. players—three minor leaguers and seven negroes—also were unlisted.

Only Feldman admitted that the Americans probably are completely out of baseball, since they can't come back to organized baseball because of a five-year ban imposed by Commissioner A. B. Chandler for "jumping" their U.S. contracts.
