Mountain Soil Moisture High

A saving factor in the serious shortage of mountain snow tributary to Central Oregon storage basins and rivers is the heavy moisture content of the underlying soil. W. T. Frost, hydraulic engineer for the Oregon cooperative snow surveys reported when in Bend today. He was on his way to his headquarters in Medford following his annual soil-sampling trip through the eastern part of the state.

Saturated soil, Frost points out, will absorb a minimum of moisture, and the surplus will find its way into the lower areas, for irrigation use.

Will Test Samples
The exact amount of moisture in the soil will not be known until weighing test of samples are completed at Medford, Frost explains. However, the moisture content of the samples appears heavy.

On his trip over the state, Frost found that the snow cover in the mountains is abnormally low. In the Crooked river drainage area, for instance, the snow cover is only 23 per cent of average—and only 16 per cent of last year.

Reds In China Seek New Base

Shanghai, March 21 (AP)—Speculation grew today that with the fall of Yenan the Chinese communists may seek to develop northern Manchuria as a major base of operations while continuing small-scale guerrilla warfare from isolated pockets within China proper.

There was no certain indication where the communists might place their main base but it was believed it might be Kiamusze, an old fur-trading center 250 miles west-northwest of Harbin and only about 70 miles from the soviet border.

Kiamusze is isolated but little more so than Yenan. Compared to Yenan's single, narrow, treacherous river and one serviceable highway Kiamusze has much better communications. It is on the banks of the Sungari river which flows to the Amur, skirting the Manchurian border and is the center of a network of short-line railroads.

Harbin was believed to be an alternate communist site. It is the most highly-developed city controlled by the communists and because of its large Russian colony is believed to be safe from nationalist bombing or ground attack—at least for the time being.

It was doubted that the Russians would object to the construction of a strong communist state along their frontiers.

The whereabouts of the top-ranking communist leaders is not yet known but it was believed they would have little difficulty in covering the 1,200-mile march from Yenan to Harbin and thence to Kiamusze.
