Tommy Bridges, the little "T" from Tennessee, was on record today as having pitched the first no-hit, no-run game in the Pacific Coast league this season as well as the initial one of a career that dates back to 1929 when he broke into organized baseball.

Now in the twilight of his career, the 41-year-old righthander just missed the perfect game when he gave up a lone base on balls in the eighth inning as Portland blanked San Francisco, 2-0, in the first game of a double-header. The Seals won the finale, 11-4, in seven innings.

Bridges, who is best remembered by baseball fans as the pitcher who chilled the Chicago Cubs in the deciding game of the 1935 world series, hurled a masterful game against the defending champions. After passing first baseman Malone (Bones) Sanders, the 155-pounder got him out of the way in a twin killing.

Uses Sweeping Curve
He employed a sweeping curve off his bumpy right arm and fanned five Seals. The losers had no men left on base while the Beavers had nine stranded off the offerings of lanky Cliff Melton, the losing pitcher.

The Portland split coupled with San Diego's two triumphs over Hollywood, 7-5 and 3-1, left the Bevos in a two-way deadlock for the league leadership.

The other two twin bills also ended in sweeps. An aroused Oakland club, faced with prospects of an impending shakeup, routed Sacramento, 6-5 and 10-1, behind a five-thomer barrage. Los Angeles took Seattle over the hurdles for a pair of victories, 2-0 and 6-2.

War Veteran
Up until yesterday, Bridges had been just another pitcher in the league. Previously he had won one game and hurled a stalemate with San Diego. Last season with Detroit, after coming out of the service, the slender pitcher won one and lost one.

Two more oldtimers, Vera Kennedy and Manuel Salvo, pitched the Padres into the first-place tie with Portland. Kennedy had the help of home runs by Pete Coscarart and Max West.

Sig Jakucki restricted the Angels to three hits in the first game, but the Seraphs put over two runs in the first inning against the Rainiers and Southpay Cliff Melton protected that margin effectively, giving up six hits.

Fletcher Chased
The Oaks chased Guy Fletcher, who was trying for his fifth straight victory, when Brooks Holder poled out two home runs in the opener. The second game was all Oakland as Glenn Crawford and Gene Lillard, a repatriated Solon, each drove the ball out of the park in the first inning. Maurice Van Robays got a three-run circuit clout in the fourth.

Nicholson Hits Two Home Runs

New York, April 21 (UP)—The Chicago Cubs, made wary by many previous relapses, were hopeful but not jubilant today over big Bill Nicholson's latest recovery from his batting "sickness."

Nicholson hit two home runs off Howie Pollet and batted in six runs yesterday as the Cubs defeated the world champion St. Louis Cardinals, 7 to 4, and if he finally has shaken his two-year slump the cubs can be pennant contenders all the way.

Today's talk was of the Cards, who were unaccountably resting in the league basement. Hank Borowy and John Schmitz stopped them with five hits yesterday, and Nicholson took care of the Cub offense as the Cards were beaten for the fourth time in six starts.

The Phillies trampled the New York Giants, 10 to 1, with a 16-hit attack helped by four Giant errors.

Pair Divided

Cincinnati and Pittsburgh divided a pair. The Reds getting 16 hits behind Ewell Blackwell, ran up a 13 to 5 triumph in the opener. Pittsburgh won the second game, 7 to 3, with 11 hits.

Brooklyn and Boston were rained out, as were the Chicago St. Louis and Detroit-Cleveland games in the American league.

Washington tripped the Boston Red Sox, 3 to 1, in one of the two junior loop games.

The New York Yankees won from the Philadelphia A's, 6 to 2 and 3 to 2 in 10 innings. Feature of the day was Joe Dimaggio's return to center field for the Yanks and his three-run homer that jagged Jess Flores with defeat in the first game. Dimaggio wore a special shoe that protected his operation-scarred heel, and fielded well.

Louis, Walcott Battle Approved

Philadelphia, April 21 (UP)—A proposed Joe Louis-Jersey Joe Walcott heavyweight title fight in Philadelphia had official approval of the National Boxing Association today, although the NBA added that it isn't in the matchmaking business.

However, the NBA executive committee noted that Walcott's managers and Promoter Herman Taylor had joined in guaranteeing Louis \$200,000. Sand said that it would approve such a bout, because Walcott is rated as the leading challenger. Louis handlers have not commented on the offer.
