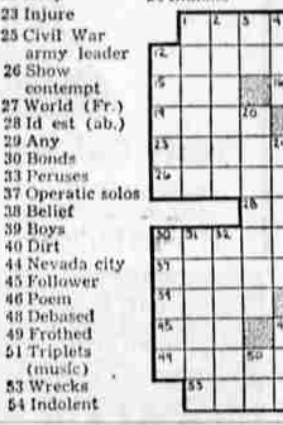

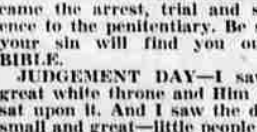

Republicans Seek Consistent Policy Toward Russians

By John L. Steele (United Press Staff Correspondent) Washington, April 21 (AP) — The administration was on notice from republican senators today that it must adopt a "more consistent" policy toward Russia or risk a breach in GOP co-operation in foreign affairs.

Several prominent GOP senators voiced dissatisfaction at present policy as the senate began the last full day of debate on President Truman's \$400,000,000 Greek-Turkish aid program. The final vote was set for 4 p. m. tomorrow and passage appeared assured by a wide margin.

Held Not Consistent Such ranking republican senators as Chairman Styles Bridges of the appropriations committee and GOP whip Kenneth S. Wherry of Nebraska charged that the \$17,000,000 post-war lend-lease contract with Russia was not consistent with President Truman's program to quarantine communism.

Senate president Arthur H. Vandenberg, R., Mich.—a chief architect of the non-partisan approach to foreign policy—remains one of its champions but he too has been critical of the lend-lease agreement.

Vandenberg told reporters that he had called off on Russia's first refusal to settle her wartime lend-lease bill.

He said the shipments should stop until Russia does settle its account. Moscow, after a year of silence, finally has agreed to begin settlement negotiations.

Vandenberg's views were directly opposed to those of Acting secretary of state Dean Acheson. The latter maintained that if congress does not permit fulfillment of the postwar contract, then congress itself must bear responsibility for breaking a legal commitment.

Building Venture Caution Voiced

Although he considers that lending agencies are adequately protected by the law's provision that 75 per cent of appraisal value shall be the base for veteran home loans, Al J. Crose, of the Oregon Veterans Affairs department, advised today that extension men proceed with the utmost caution in home building ventures. His recommendation was given at the weekly noon luncheon of the Bend Kiwanis club, held in the newly re-opened Pine Tavern.

Crose referred to inflated prices of material and labor, predicted that there will come a "leveling off" and suggested that until then it will be the part of wisdom to "go slow."

Benefits Checked Introduced by Joe E. Van Wormer, program chairman, Crose checked rapidly over the various

benefits, for education, training, and business investment, as well as for home purchase, that are made available to veterans under state and federal laws. He emphasized that abuse of unemployment payment opportunities by civilians with no recent armed service background has been far greater than has come to attention in the so-called 52-20 clubs of recently discharged service men.
