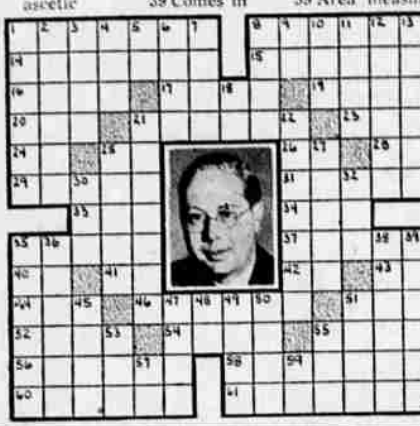

Relief Family Lives In Suite

New York, May 21 (AP)—A family which went on home relief last November is being maintained by the New York City welfare department in a \$315-a-month hotel suite, with a monthly allowance for clothing, food and laundry and free mail service, it was disclosed yesterday.

The family, which abandoned its \$25-a-month steamless flat to go on relief, has received an average of \$125 a week for rent and food, the father of the family said. The case came to light when the 35-year-old father was summoned before domestic relations court Justice James V. Mulholland on a charge of failing to send his 7-year-old boy to school.

"I'm unhappy hanging around the hotel," the father told the court. He said he had not sent the child to school because he momentarily expected to take a job in a town 150 miles from New York.

Family Of 5 Crosses U. S. On Bicycles

Seattle, May 21 (AP)—Having three children under 8 years old did not stop Mr. and Mrs. R. K. Parker from making a bicycle trip from Winterhaven, Fla., to Seattle.

The Parker family pedaled into Seattle Monday after a six-month journey of 3,429 miles aboard a home-made rig powered by two bicycles. The contraption consisted of rowboat-like arrangement of canvas suspended between the two bicycles. The canvas carrier was divided into three compartments, one each for Dick, S. Vonnell, 2, and Dwight, 1, the Parker children.

Use Bicycle

Last fall Parker, a native of Florida, decided he would like to move to Seattle, but couldn't afford train fare for his family of five. So they started out November 13 on the home-made bicycle rig.

"We made about 45 or 50 miles a day," Parker said. "We shipped our clothes ahead about 200 miles and changed when we caught up with them."

The bicycles on which the family arrived here were the third pair they had used on the trip. One set was run over by a car in Texas and the second pair "just plain wore out in California," Parker said.

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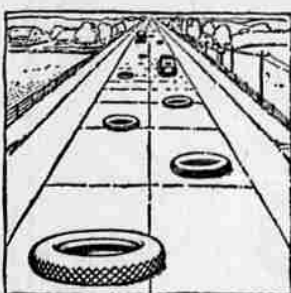
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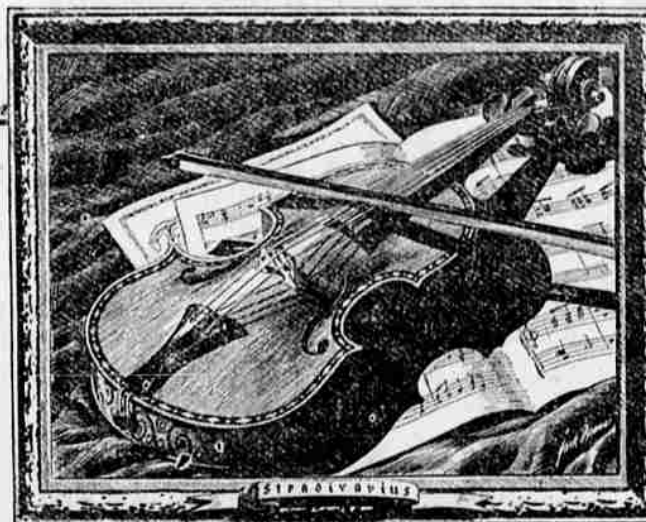
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
