

20 Army Airmen 'Chute To Safety

Merkel, Tex., May 21 (AP)—Police and volunteers searched the rocky rangeland near here today for three of 20 army fliers who parachuted from their B-29 bomber after an engine and wing caught fire in flight.

The plane crashed four miles west of here and the 17 known survivors of the jump were picked up as far away as 20 miles west of the city.

Thirteen of the 17 who were held overnight at Abilene, Sweetwater and Merkel hospitals for treatment of minor injuries. Most seriously hurt was Master Sgt. Don Lee Ellis, 26, of Paris, Tex., who suffered a broken arm.

All 20 men aboard got away safely, with the pilot, Capt. Alfonso Camerana, the last man to leave the plane.

Searchers believed that they would pick up the three missing men some time after dawn when visibility increased.

Youthful Veteran New Denver Chief

Denver, May 21 (AP)—Quigg Newton, youthful navy veteran who pledged to rid city hall of machine rule, was elected mayor of Denver by a landslide vote margin today.

Unofficial tabulation on the five-man race gave the 35-year-old attorney a two-to-one majority of the 135,000 votes cast in yesterday's city election.

It was a heavy defeat for one of the last big-city machine mayors. Aging Benjamin Stapleton, who reigned over Denver for two decades, came out a poor third.

Tokyo Residents Jarred By Quake

Tokyo, May 21 (AP)—Tokyo residents were jarred from their sleep at 4:55 a.m. today by the sharpest earthquake in recent months, but officials reported there was no damage.

Weather observers said the epicenter was about 45 miles north-east of Tokyo.

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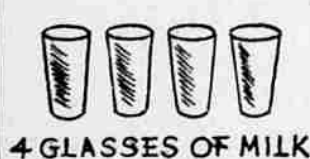
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
