The same bugaboo that has dogged many other good clubs cropped up in the Pacific coast league today for the second time in three days and the victim each time was the league-leading San Francisco Seals.

Manager James (Rip) Collins, of San Diego, a freshman as far as managers go in the circuit, sent southpaw Al Olsen against the Seals Tuesday night and that worthy came through in easy

fashion, Manny Salvo, a right-hander, was shelled hard by the Seals Wednesday night so last night Collins came back with Al Treichel, another portsider, and the jinx paid off in the form of a 10-3 victory for the Padres.

Acorns Move Up
The San Francisco reverse coupled with Oakland's 8-2 triumph over Seattle lifted the Acorns into second place two percentage points over Los Angeles and one game off the Seals' neck. Hollywood applied the white wash brush to the Angels, 3 to 0, with George (Pinky) Woods getting credits for his fourth straight victory. Portland came to life after dropping two straight to Sacramento and whipped the Solons, 5 to 3.

Treichel received excellent batting support from Johnny (Suede) Jensen and first baseman Vince Shupe who each collected four hits and scored three runs apiece. The southpaw pitcher stopped the Seals in six hits while his teammates scored four runs in the first frame and again in the ninth. Two more runs crossed in the sixth.

Suds Are Chilled

Record Survives
Only because neither Todd nor Ransom was as proficient on the first nine as on the last did Snead's record survive the day. Todd, a young Dallas pro, matched par 35 on the out trip, then posted a four-under 32 on the return. Ransom, a 36-year-old veteran from Ravinia, Ill., had 34 and 33, while Harbert, Northville, Mich., had 33 and 34.

Par 71 was broken by 13 players while eight others matched the regulation figures.

Yesterday's performance lent added strength to the belief that the 281 record set by Ralph Guldahl in winning the 1937 crown would be punctured by Saturday's winner.

Shoot at Record
Today the field will shoot at the 139 record for 36 holes. This mark was first set by Chick Evans, Jr., in 1916 and was equalled by Snead in 1939. Experienced observers pointed out that even a 70 by one of the three leaders would provide a new record, or that a 68 by one of the other par-busters would have the same effect.

South Africa's pride, Bobby Locke, turned out to be the darling of the St. Louis gallery and he responded to their applause by nearly forcing a quadruple tie for the lead. Bobby came to the 18th green three-under par and attempted a 10-foot putt for a birdie.

Had it dropped he would have posted the fourth 67. Instead, it stopped two inches shy, and the 2,000 fans who trailed him all around the course groaned in sympathy. He scored a 68 to occupy the undisputed runner-up position.

St. Louis, June 13 (UP)—A dozen par-busting pros, and a lone amateur, threatened today to smash every scoring mark in the 47-year history of the National Open tourney.

The record-breaking pace was forecast yesterday when three under-rated entrants, Harry Todd, Henry Ransom and Chick Harbet, blasted the short 6,532-yard St. Louis country club links for four-under-par 67's.
