Mr. Labertew was born April 17, 1892, in Anchor, Ill. He attended schools in Illinois and in Boseman, Mont. He came to Oregon in 1912. A life-long railroad man, he was assigned to Bend in 1931, when he brought his family here to make their home.

He leaves his wife, two daughters, Mrs. R. W. Davis, of Vancouver, B. C., Canada, and Mrs. Thompson; three grandsons, one granddaughter, and two brothers, M. C. Labertew, of Portland, and Rex, of Bozeman, Mont.
