

Portland Pushes Into Third-Place Tie With Oaks

Portland's 13th victory in 14 games, the Pacific coast league's greatest winning spurge of the season, boosted the hopped-up Beavers into a third-place tie today.

Only two weeks ago bogged down in the cellar, the Beavers today were rubbing elbows with Oakland—and making muscled like a real pennant contender.

They edged San Diego 2-1 last night to continue their climb, pulling within eight games of the top for the first invasion of the Los Angeles-San Francisco-Oakland monopoly of the hot spots since early in the season.

Oakland helped out by handing Oakland its 10th defeat in 12 starts, 4-1. Los Angeles clung to its six-and-a-half-game margin over the Seals by edging evening Hollywood, 8-2, and Seattle rallied to beat Sacramento, 4-3.

Portland had a tough job against the Padres, however. The Beavers got both their runs in the first inning before Al Trelch settled down to pitch shut-out ball for the rest of the game. A long fly by Mayo Smith and Harvey Storey's double drove in the Beavers runs. San Diego got its only run on a two-bagger by Max West in the fourth. Vince

Superior came right back in the first of the second with a single by Weber, right fielder, and a double by Les Hufstadler, center fielder, who has been hitting the ball like a fiend lately, pushed him around.
