

Plans Outlined For Expansion Of 4-H Program

Corvallis, Aug. 21 (Special)—A five-point program for expanding and improving 4-H work in Oregon has been announced by F. L. Ballard, associate director of the O. S. C. extension service. The program is designed to increase enrollment slightly above last year's total of 22,000, increase the percentage of club members completing their projects, give more training to voluntary local leaders, and guide the selection of and organization of 4-H club projects in the counties in line with the general over-all rural affairs program being worked out by the farm families of each county in rural program-making conferences.

The first step in the program, Ballard explained, is the building of a new staff of leaders, a development necessitated by retirement of H. C. Seymour and Miss Helen Cowgill, veteran members of the extension club department staff. L. J. Allen has replaced Seymour as state club leader. Mrs. Winnifred Gillen, former Klamath county home demonstration agent, has replaced Miss Cowgill. Cal Monroe was added to the staff as assistant state leader some months ago.

To Add Leaders
Two other experienced and highly qualified leaders in this field will be added to the club staff within the next six months, Ballard said.

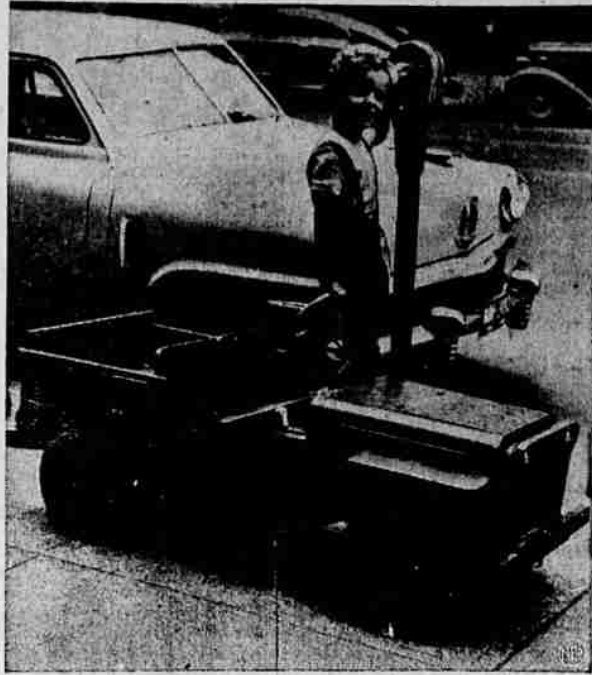
Commenting that only slightly more than 77 per cent of the state's 4-H members completed their projects last year, the associate director said, it is the opinion of many that completion should reach 85 per cent of the regular enrollment. Work with volunteer local leaders will be aimed at raising the percentage of completions, he stated.

The 35 projects now available to Oregon 4-H members are being carefully studied with a view to adding some new ones and eliminating others. One series of new clubs which likely will be offered lies in the field of wildlife. Attention also is being given to promotion of projects that are in line with recommendations of county program planning conferences.

Hala-Kahiki Pie by Martha Meade

This delightfully refreshing pineapple pie brings a flavor from Pacific isles to your table. And when baked with Sperry Drifted Snow Flour, your baking results are guaranteed.

Sift flour before measuring. Use level measurements for all ingredients.

Stir together in the top part of a double boiler—
1/4 cup granulated sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 egg yolks, unbeaten
1/4 cup top milk, or thin cream
1 1/2 cups grated canned pineapple, undrained

Cook mixture over continuously boiling water until slightly thickened, about 15 minutes, stirring occasionally. Remove from heat and add—
3 tablespoons butter, or margarine
1 tablespoon granulated gelatin, softened in 1/2 cup cold milk
1 teaspoon grated lemon rind
1 tablespoon lemon juice

Stir until gelatin is dissolved. Cool, and when mixture begins to jelly fold in—
2 egg whites, stiffly beaten

Then pour filling into—
a baked and cooled 9-inch pie shell

Let pie stand in the refrigerator or a cool place until firm. When served, pie may be garnished with mounds of sweetened whipped cream topped with well-drained pineapple. 6 servings.

PASTRY
Measure into a mixing bowl—
1/2 cup shortening
3 tablespoons cold water
1 teaspoon salt

Blend ingredients together with a fork until shortening is creamy and absorbs part of water. Then add all at once—
1 1/2 cups sifted Sperry Drifted Snow "Home-Perfected" Enriched Flour

Stir, with circular motion, until pastry holds its shape. Turn out on lightly floured board, pressing quickly into a smooth ball. Roll pastry until it will extend 1/2 inch beyond outer rim of a 9-inch pie pan. Fold pastry in half, lift quickly and place in pan. Unfold, and gently press in place so that there are no air pockets beneath pastry. Build up fluted edge, or finish edge in any way desired. Prick bottom and sides of shell liberally with a fork to allow steam formed beneath crust to escape during baking. Bake in a very hot oven, 450°, for 10-12 minutes, or until nicely browned. Cool before filling. Pastry for a 9-inch pie shell.
