

O.S.C. Museum Is Reopened

Corvallis, Aug. 21 (Special)—The Horner museum, closed for repairs and renovation for the past month, was reopened Aug. 15 with a newly appointed curator, Miss Lula M. Stephenson, in charge. Miss Stephenson succeeds Mrs. Mary Bowman Hull who retired July 1.

The new curator attended both Oregon State and Washington State colleges and has served for the past six years as secretary of the school of pharmacy. She was born in Pullman, Wash., a descendant of Pacific coast pioneers, and has maintained a keen interest in historical objects and antiques.

One of the main attractions for tourist visitors to the O. S. C. campus, the Horner museum was visited by more than 3500 persons in June who came from nearly every state and from 12 foreign countries.

Steen Praises Air Travel For Farms

Corvallis, Aug. 21 (Special)—The skyways rather than the highways appeal to Harold Steen, Hilton, president of the Oregon Flying Farmers association, as the best way to get from eastern to western Oregon, he remarked after flying to Corvallis recently to make final arrangements for the state convention there Aug. 24 to 26.

Steen, who flew down the Columbia in a small plane, making only one stop at The Dalles en route, said he considered the trip safer than driving over the tortuous curves of the Columbia highway, and more economical, as he used only 12 gallons of gas for the trip, while saving many hours of time.

Final plans for the convention was worked out with W. L. Teutsch, assistant director of extension and college adviser to the association officers, call for a busy program of business, discussions, demonstrations and an annual banquet scheduled for Monday night.

Coast-To-Coast' Flight Takes 10 Minutes
Wichita, Kan. (UP)—Pilot Bert Briney's home office in Wichita was puzzled—for a while—when he cabled from Santiago, Chile, that he had flown coast-to-coast

in 10 minutes and six seconds.

Amplification of his message revealed that while delivering a Beech Aircraft plane to a buyer in the South American country he had crossed the Isthmus of Panama from ocean to ocean in that time.

Briney piloted the single-engine cabin plane from Wichita to the Chilean capital, a distance of 7,000 miles, in 50½ hours flying time.

Super Air Conditioner Make It 85 Below

Rochester, N.Y. (UP)—A super deluxe air conditioning system, guaranteed to bring the mercury down to 85 degrees below zero, will be in operation at the Eastman Kodak Co. this summer.

Designed to speed up condensing operations in the production of photographic goods, the refrigeration system is being constructed at a cost of \$1,000,000.

The system uses nearly two miles of nickel steel pipe which will carry 100,000 tons of methylene chloride. Each cooling unit is capable of turning out 375 tons of refrigeration daily at 85 degrees below zero.

Laughing Thief Sought As Robber Of Blind

Indianapolis (UP)—A thief who laughed while robbing a blind woman is wanted by Indianapolis police.

Mrs. Essa Bunce told police that while her husband was out for a few minutes she heard someone walking through the house. When

she asked who it was, "All I got was a laugh."

Her husband returned to find that the intruder had taken a purse containing \$28 and a wrist watch.

Distant Sea Explosions To Be Pin-Pointed

Pittsburgh (UP)—Science has developed a new method of pinpointing explosions at sea from stations thousands of miles away. Dubbed SOFAR, the war-developed discovery was explained by Dr. J. A. Peoples at a meeting of the Society of Exploratory Geophysicists.

Peoples said the new technique is based on the proved fact that moderate to small amounts of sound travel thousands of miles at certain sea levels.

He said that by installing a few receiving stations along sea coasts, men could locate accurately any point at sea at which

an explosion occurred.
