

Stockmen Ask For Disease Free District

Cattle raisers of Deschutes county requested beef cattle as well as dairy cattle be tested for Bangs disease and that steps be taken to make the county a disease free area, at a meeting at the courthouse in Bend last Friday.

Represented at the meeting were members of the county livestock disease control committee: John Bradetich, Fred Shepard, Ellis Edington, and Del Davis; members of the Deschutes county court: A. E. Stevens, E. E. Varco and Judge C. L. Allen. E. L. Petersen, director of the Oregon state department of agriculture; M. E. Knickerbocker, head division of animal industries, state department of agriculture; Gene M. Lear, Deschutes county agent, and county veterinarians Dr. R. L. Lewis and Dr. W. D. Ward.

E. L. Petersen, director of state department of agriculture, explained the recent changes in the Bangs law and asked the county veterinarians to report on the incidence of the disease in the area and the results of using vaccine to eliminate Bangs disease from herds that had shown at least 10 per cent of the disease when tested. It was pointed out the vaccine had been effective in helping to clean up badly affected herds but that Bangs disease could not entirely be eliminated in this manner.

Law Amended
Amendments to the Bangs disease law made at the last session of the state legislature exempt beef cattle from compulsory provisions of the law except in counties where at least 100 cattle raisers petition the county court to make the testing provision a requirement for beef operators of the area. The livestock committee recommended at this meeting that petitions be circulated to make all of Deschutes county a compulsory testing area for all cattle.

The method of financing the Bangs disease program was also changed and one-half of the cost of the program will now be borne by the cattle raiser. The fees for testing to be charged by the county veterinarians will be \$2.50 for one head, \$1.00 a head for one to five head, and 50 cents a head for herds having more than five head. The county veterinarians agreed to co-operate with the program by presenting a bill for the testing

at the time the testing is made. It was pointed out by County Judge C. L. Allen, that by this arrangement it would be possible for the county to continue making indemnity payments for reactor cattle which probably wouldn't be possible if the county were asked to pay the entire cost of the testing.

The county veterinarians pointed out the amount of Bangs disease in the county was only approximately 1 per cent in 1946, and in order to keep the disease down it will be necessary for everyone to co-operate.

Want Control
County Judge Allen and the livestock growers indicated they wished some type of control be set up to require persons moving livestock into the area to have a health certificate showing his livestock to be free of disease. Director Petersen pointed out that if 60 per cent of the livestock owners in the county petition the state department, a disease free area could be established and a health certificate required from anyone moving stock into the county. The livestock committee and the county court agreed that this should be done as soon as possible, therefore, petitions will be circulated to make the county a disease free area.

Explains Law
M. E. Knickerbocker, head of the division of animal industry, state department of agriculture, briefly explained the new law which regulates the operation of sales yards and the new brand inspection law. Knickerbocker pointed out that any livestock being transported by truck or trailer must have a transportation certificate or a brand inspection certificate. If the animals are just being moved from farm to farm, the transportation certificate is adequate. If the animals are being sold for slaughter, a brand inspection is required.

Knickerbocker pointed out the transportation certificate blanks are available at the county agent's office or from Lloyd Priddy, brand inspector, for the area.

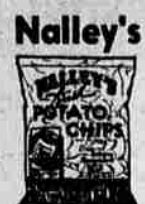
