

USC Team Held Best In West; Talents Paraded

San Francisco, Oct. 21 (UP) — There's one thing about the men from old USC: They never hide their light under a bushel basket.

"We've got the best football team in the west," says Dick Nash, publicist for the Trojans, "and we should be installed as favorites over California for our game in Berkeley Saturday."

Everything Mr. Nash has to say may or may not win a nod of approval from Jeff Cravath, USC coach. But the fact remains that if the Trojans don't whip the Bears on Saturday, nobody will be to blame except Mr. Cravath.

Pleanty Of Reserves
"We've got two great lines and the best backfield set in the Pacific coast conference," Nash modestly announces. And if you think we are tough this year, just wait until next. Our team has 18 sophomores on it—all good.

"And can you beat this for passing?" George Murphy, our starting T-formation quarterback, played only 20 minutes against Oregon State. But in that time he completed seven out of nine passes!

Over at California, where everything is more conservative, Coach Lynn (Pappy) Waldorf, hero of the 1947 grid campaign, more or less agrees with Nash.

Fumble Is Factor
"The only way we'll ever lick USC is for them to co-operate with us in our best line of offense: The recovered fumble. We recovered six against Wisconsin and five against Washington State and that's the thing that has brought us victory," explained Pappy to the Northern California Football Writers' meeting.

Marchie Schwartz of the winless Stanford Indians, still is optimistic about his chances.

Show Improvement
"Our boys showed some improvement against UCLA—especially in spirit. We may give Washington a good battle," said Marchie. "My scouts report that

Springfield, Team That Beat Eugene, 12 To 6, Will Play Bend Bears Here Friday Night

The Lava Bears, returning to Bruin field this Friday night after two successive Willamette valley games, will again face a major test in their drive for the Big Six title when they meet the heavy Springfield eleven.

The Springfield team opened the year with a 31-0 loss to Corvallis, but that was before any team was aware that the Spartans had Fullback Sam Baker in their lineup. Since that time teams have planned their defenses to stop Baker and he has seldom run wild as he did against the Millers.

The Millers then came back strong to dump Eugene 12 to 6, tripped the strong Milwaukie team 6 to 0 and last week lost a thriller to Salem 26 to 25, although they outplayed the Vikings in first downs and yardage gained.

The Millers are a heavy team, capable of fielding a line that will average nearly 190 pounds. Much of this weight is carried in the tackle positions with Alvin Cedros, 215 pounds, and E. L. Welch, 210, usually starting at those posts. Their backfield ace is Wendell King, who has done the major portion of the team's scoring from its quarterback position.

The bears were able to get in only a short workout yesterday afternoon on the edges of the rain-soaked Bruin field. This afternoon they will get their heavy workout of the week with a scrimmage session and Wednesday they will rush up on offensive tactics. The squad came through the Albany game without injury and should be in peak condition for the final Big Six game.
