

Panthers, Bears To Tangle Tonight In Tough Contest

Central Oregon basketball is expected to reach one of the season's peaks tonight when the Bend and Redmond teams play their first game of the season on the Redmond court.

The only previous encounter of the season for the two teams was at the hoop jamboree at Redmond early in December, when the Panthers staged a full-scale offensive drive to take a quarter-length game by two points.

In preparation for the league contest tonight, the Bears had a two and one-half hour practice session last night, in which Coach Russ Acheson drilled the team to correct errors in play at Salem Saturday night. The Bears will attempt to place their fast-break offensive into high gear tonight in trying to crack the tight Redmond defense.

Fast Game Looms

A fast game is forecast for tonight as both teams have players capable of going at top speed for an entire contest. A scoring duel between Bend's Bill Sheffield and Redmond's Stan Sturza is possible as both of these players have led their respective teams in scoring in most games to date.

Backboard play is expected to feature Jim Riggs, of Redmond, and Doug Hogland, of Bend, both of whom have turned in stellar work under the hoop in recent contests.

Acheson said he would take 12 players to Redmond. The starting lineup will include Don Benson and Lowell Maudlin at forwards, Hogland at center and Sheffield and Bob Haves at guards. Redmond is expected to start Kenneth Fairchild and Phil Weigand at forwards, Riggs at center and Verle Hammack and Stan Sturza at guards.

Other Bend players who will make up the traveling squad are: Don Bushnell, Al Christensen, Ted McKee, Larry Standifer, Roger Van Nest and Bruce Long-bulla.

The Bend club team, coached by Hank Nilsen, will play the Redmond Kittens in a preliminary at 7 o'clock, with the main game to get under way at 8 p.m.

Leahy May Get Navy Coach Job

Annapolis, Md., Jan. 13 (UP)—A big time college coach—perhaps even Frank Leahy of Notre Dame—was expected to be named shortly to direct navy's football team as the academy launched a new policy today of operating on the gridiron without benefit of its ancient and obsolete graduate system.

Whether Leahy had been approached or whether he would take the job even if he were, belonged with the speculation that found navy's seadog mentor, Capt. Tom Hamilton at South Bend, Ind., the home of the fighting Irish, at precisely the time that he navy announced it was junking its civilian coaching system.

Hamilton was there, presumably to attend a sports banquet, but in view of the fact that Leahy was a war time navy officer, there seemed a remote chance that he might consider coaching the Middies in peace time—for a sizeable sum.

Vandals Defeat OSC Quint 47-43 In Hard Contest

Moscow, Ida., Jan. 13 (UP)—The unpredictable University of Idaho basketball team meets a vengeful Oregon State quintet tonight after breaking a tie in the last 90 seconds of play last night to dump the defending Pacific coast conference champions 47 to 43.

The lead changed 11 times during the game with no more than five points separating the two teams at any time. Jack Phoenix, six-foot-nine-inch Idaho center, pushed in the winning basket, and Preston Brimhall added another for good measure before time ran out. Phoenix was high point man for his team with 17. Guard Al Torrey starred for the Beavers with 13 points and was responsible for the tying basket with 90 seconds to go.

Pre-season dopesters had picked Idaho as the weakest team in the loop. It was recalled, however, that the Vandals' sole 1947 victory in 16 starts was against Oregon State, which went on to take the pennant.

Tonight's game will be the fourth in five nights for the Oregonians.

Touchdown Point Would Be Voided

Philadelphia, Jan. 13 (UP)—Commissioner Bert Bell of the National football league, who is sternly opposed to the point after touchdown, said today he would advocate its elimination as a means of combatting gamblers.

Bell, who has had no announced support among club owners for his drastic proposal, said elimination of the extra point would be "one answer to the sucker odds now being offered by gamblers."

"Gamblers are milking the public now by trimming odds down to as low as one-half point," Bell said. "With the extra point gone, their spread would have to be at least three points."

Bell announced his stand against the extra point and in favor of a "sudden death" appended period to wipe out all league tie games, as the National league rules committee prepared to go into session at New York to discuss rules changes.

Quiz of Boxing Asked in East

New York, Jan. 13 (UP)—At the same time that a grand jury sought to get all details on possible irregularities in the New York professional fight game, state Sen. Isador Dolinger, a democrat from Manhattan's 26th district clamored today for a \$50,000 investigation of the sport.

Dolinger, who said at Albany that "unfair, unwholesome and deplorable conditions exist in professional boxing within the state," introduced a resolution for the appointment of a seven man committee which would have the power to subpoena witnesses and documents and to go anywhere necessary to obtain evidence of fraud or corruption.

Hollywood, Jan. 13 (UP)—The preliminaries in 1948's round of Hollywood nightclub brawls were over today with writer Ivan Goff claiming a decision over director Otto Preminger, 41, in Le Papillon bar Sunday night.

The brief encounter was over Natalie Draper who played the king's mistress in "Forever Amber." Goff reportedly wooed her away from Preminger a couple of months ago.

Goff admitted he struck three blows before someone pulled him off Preminger. He suffered a cut forehead in the scrap.
