125 Attend Parish Dinner; Officers Named For Year

Everett Wiles and George Bueger were elected as trustees of First Lutheran church, and Oscar Engstrom was retained in the office of deacon, at a parish dinner and business meeting held Sunday evening in the church dining room, when a budget exceeding \$6000 was approved for the 1948 year. More than 125 people attended.

The new trustees replace Norman Sather and Ray Anderson. Other hold-over officers, voted in as a group, by acclamation, include Holger Christensen, secretary; Noble Anderson, treasurer; Carl Raupach, Sunday school superintendent; Mrs. Nels Skjersaa, organist; Job Moan, head usher, and Robert Fagg, Robert Nordby, Harvey Jacobson, Phil Pederson, N. O. Anderson and Larry Lermo, assistant ushers. The slate of candidates was presented by the nominating committee, consisting of Otto Larson, Reidar Rold and Oscar Osmond. Deacons who will hold office another year are Julius Rold and Job Moan.

The budget for the current year was presented by the 1947 board of trustees, which included Stanley Kobbie, Lermo and Sather, as well as the trustees of deacons. The women's organization of the church served the dinner, which featured baked ham and scalloped potatoes.

The main order of business for the evening was the presentation of reports by representatives of various organizations of the church.

Jackie Nystrom gave the Luther league report, which was prepared by Beverly Ernst. It indicated a successful year, with projects including participation in the purchase of a mimeograph and the securing of stoles in church-year colors, to match the altar and pulpit hangings. Raymond Knutson presented the financial report.

Mrs. Helen Simonsen gave the report for the Lutheran Daughters of the Reformation, which showed activities taking care of a large share of incidental church administration expenses, meeting a \$500 pledge to the building fund, securing altar and pulpit hangings in the church-year colors, and planning as a project for this year, the establishment of a fund for the purchase of a church organ.

The Ladies' Aid report was given by Mrs. Ole Nordby, indicating a busy and successful year, with activities including a share in supporting the church's musical program, payment of incidental church expenses, establishment of a reserve for furnishing a pastor's study, and plans for redecoration of the parsonage this year.

The financial report was given by Carl Raupach, Sunday school superintendent, reported that the school has a staff of 15 officers and teachers, an enrollment of 145 children, and an average Sunday attendance of 100 children. At the present time, the library auditorium is being rented on Sunday mornings to take care of overflow classes. He also mentioned the junior worship service for the Sunday school, inaugurated this year, which begins at 10:35 a.m. each Sunday. The financial report was prepared by Mrs. S. Tolten, treasurer.

Tunney To Seek Uranium Ores

Toronto, Ont., Jan. 13 (UP)—Gene Tunney, former world heavyweight boxing champion, said today that Gold-Uranium Exploration, Ltd., of which he is the newly elected president, plans to explore 2,000 acres of mineral claims to add to its holdings of two uranium and two gold developments.

He said that because of the "question of national security involved" the company would see that "every care is taken in the proper exploration of its claims."

Chinese To Quit Manchurian Cities

Shanghai, Jan. 13 (UP)—The Chinese government was reliably reported today to have decided to abandon two of its most important cities in Manchuria—Mukden and Kirin—to the communists, and to concentrate on defending Mukden.

Abandonment of the two cities, each about 200 miles north of Mukden, would mean withdrawal from a narrow corridor which the nationalists have held since V-J day.

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
