Federal Hospital
Program Studied

Portland, Jan. 13 (UP)—Oregon communities today were considering participating in a federal hospital program.

Dr. Harold Erickson, state health officer, explained the program here Monday to more than 100 persons representing various Oregon cities and towns. He said the program called for expenditure of two-thirds of construction costs by the communities with the federal government providing the remainder.

Erickson said that \$460,000 had been allocated to Oregon for this year with similar sums available annually for four more years. Plans must be submitted before July 1 or the state will lose its 1947 allocation, Erickson explained.

9,000 Beds Short

The health officer estimated Oregon's shortage of hospital beds at approximately 9,000 including beds needed for mental patients and chronic disease cases.

The federal plan, operated by the U.S. Public Health Service, gives priority to communities presently without hospital facilities, Erickson said, and in Oregon rural communities are expected to claim most of the federal support funds.

Underpass Scene
Of Truck Crash

Traffic through the Franklin underpass in Bend was detoured yesterday for nearly an hour following an accident involving a large truck and a pickup. The pickup was driven by Paul Stanley Fisher, 23, Bend, and the truck by Fred Romoff, 29, Los Angeles, Calif.

Wheels of the two vehicles locked, and the large truck, which Romoff was unable to stop, pushed the pickup all the way through the underpass. When the smaller car became disintegrated, it was thrown against the rock wall of the viaduct. Considerable damage occurred.

The big truck was also damaged, and both cars were towed from the underpass. Two standard test-weight railroad cars of the National Bureau of Standards are in constant use throughout the country in testing railway master scales for determining the weight of loaded freight cars.

Alaska Highway
Projects Backed

Portland, Ore., Jan. 13 (UP)—A recommendation for improvement of Trans-Canada highways to Alaska today had the stamp of approval of chamber of commerce delegates from 11 western states.

The recommendation came in the form of a resolution passed by the western states' council at its meeting here Monday. Development of Alaska's transportation facilities and specific improvement on the Haines and Alcan highways were also called for.

Brig. Gen. G. B. Butler, chief of the 6th army engineers, San Francisco, said that Russia is showing tremendous activity in Siberia and warned that Alaska is the "most vulnerable part of our entire defense."

The Seattle chamber of commerce urged construction of a standard-gauge railway connecting Puget Sound and Fairbanks by way of Quesnel, B. C., and the previously-surveyed route through the Rocky mountain trench.

The meeting was presided over by Louis Lundborg, secretary of the San Francisco chamber of commerce.

S. S. Taylor Dies
At Home of Son

S. S. Taylor, a long-time resident of Redmond, died Monday, Jan. 12, at the home of his son, Marion E. Taylor, in that city.

Funeral services will be Thursday at 2 p.m. in the Christian church, Redmond, with Rev. D. L. Penhollow officiating and burial will follow in the cemetery there beside the grave of his wife, who preceded him in death in 1942. Zacher mortuary is in charge of arrangements.

Mr. Taylor was born near Winona, Minn., and would have been 86 on Jan. 19. He came west as a young man and settled in Kittitas Valley, Wash., moving to Forest Grove, Ore., in 1910. In 1915 he moved to Redmond.

In 1881, he had been married to Carrie M. Reigel, and the couple had three children, two of whom survive. They are Marion E. Taylor, of Redmond, and Mrs. C. B. Tucker, of Ellensburg, Wash. Sydney P. Taylor, their other son, died in 1918.

Other survivors are a sister, Mrs. Mary Coleman, of Sappaville, Calif.; four grandchildren, Mrs. Jack Ryan, Seattle, Wash., Mrs. George T. Murphy, Bend, and Sidney E. and Irvin C. Taylor, both of Redmond. There are also seven great grandchildren.

Josephus Daniels
Clinging to Life

Raleigh, N. C., Jan. 13 (UP)—Josephus Daniels, 85-year-old editor and former ambassador to Mexico, clung tenaciously to life today many hours after doctors gave up hope that he might rally and declared that only his "amazing vitality" was keeping him alive.

The editor of the Raleigh News and Observer lay in a deep coma brought on by pneumonia and complications of age. He went to bed with a cold nine days ago and his condition steadily worsened. His four sons maintained a constant vigil at his bedside.

Mission Leader
To Speak in Bend

Rev. Harold C. Etter, general director of the international Christian Leprosy mission, will tell the story of the mission's work in caring for persons afflicted with leprosy in the Orient, at a meeting at the First Baptist church in Bend on Wednesday at 7:30 p.m. Results of modern medical treatment of this disease, which touched millions in the Orient, will be discussed. The address will be illustrated with motion pictures and slides secured by Dr. Etter on his two post-war trips to the Orient. In those trips, he traveled some 45,000 miles in ten months, in India, China and the Philippines.

Leprosy afflicts at least 10,000,000 in the world, but only about 5 per cent have been reached with medical care or the gospel, Rev. Etter said. Only in the last few years have such drugs as promin been discovered and used which quickly reduce lesions, heal ulcers and restore the patient to normal health, the mission director said.

The program of the I.C.L.M. emphasizes evangelistic work, preventive therapy and training of Christian leprosy workers. The I.C.L.M. is interdenominational in personnel, and supports its own work in various fields, and also cooperates with other evangelical missions and missionaries, leaders report.

Dies at Age of 69

Owen Bruce Gray, 69, died this morning at the Lumberman's hospital where he had been a patient since Dec. 30. A cerebral hemorrhage was the cause of death. Funeral services will be held Thursday at 2 p.m. from the Prineville funeral chapel, and burial will follow in the Masonic cemetery there. Rev. W. N. Byars will conduct the rites.

Mr. Gray, who was employed by Brooks-Scanlon, Inc., had been a resident of Bend for the past five and a half years. He and his wife who survives him, made their home at 1520 Division. He was a native of Prineville, and was a member of the Masonic lodge in the Crook county town.

Besides his wife, he leaves a son, Gerald B. Gray, of Aloha; a daughter, Mrs. Beulah E. Glasgow, of Portland; two brothers, O. C. Gray, of Seattle, and Roy E. Gray, of Prineville, and a sister, Mrs. Goldie Stoker, of Prineville. There are also three grandchildren.
