

Bend Bears Beat Eugene Axemen In Big 6 Contest

The Bend Lava Bears scored a clear-cut victory over the Eugene Axemen here last night, 60 to 51, to move from last place up to fourth place in the Big Six league.

The Lava Bears moved into a 10 to 4 lead after five minutes of the first quarter had been played and were never in trouble the rest of the game.

Lowell Maudlin, Bend forward, was the big gun for the Bears in the opening quarter, sinking five field goals for 10 of the Bears' 18 first quarter points. First period score was 18 to 12 for Bend.

Sheffield Again High

Bill Sheffield, Bend guard, was again high scorer for the game with 25 points, earned from 10 field goals and five free throws. Sheffield's scoring was well-sustained through the game, but was heaviest in the final period when he collected 10 points. Don Benson, Bend's other forward, had a good evening with six field goals and two free throws for 14 points.

Linder, a Eugene substitute, was high for his team with 15 points.

The Axemen carried a big height advantage in the game and had better than average control of the backboards. The Bears nullified this with a higher number of interceptions, smoother floor play, and better shooting.

Tonight the Bears will wind up their Big Six season in a game here with Springfield. The main game is called for 7:30 p. m. with the junior varsity game to follow.

Heavyweight Fighter Fatally Injured In Chicago Match

Chicago, Feb. 21 (AP) Sam Baroudi, a 20-year-old New York Negro light heavyweight boxer, died in a hospital today from injuries suffered in a bout with Ezzard Charles last night and police scheduled an immediate inquest.

It was probable the inquest would return a verdict of accidental death. Baroudi died at Columbus hospital at 4:48 a. m. (CST), approximately five hours after he was hauled unconscious out of the Chicago stadium ring.

Meanwhile, it was revealed that Baroudi killed another Negro boxer, Glenn Newton Smith, 23, at North Adams, Mass., August 15, 1947. Smith was knocked out in the ninth round and never regained consciousness. Baroudi was exonerated at an inquest.

Eugene, Ore., Feb. 21 (AP) — The University of Washington remained undefeated in northern division swimming competition today and also was holder of two new records after defeating Oregon's mermen 49 to 26 here yesterday.

Pete Poulsson clipped eight-tenths of a minute off the 220-yard freestyle meet record set by Jack Medica of Washington in 1934. His time was 2:13.31.

The Washington medley relay team of George Heaney, Jack Powell and Dick Campbell set a new division record in the 300-yard medley relay of 3:01. The old record, held by Oregon since 1940, was 3:01.31. A new pool record in the 400-yard freestyle relay was not allowed when Washington was disqualified in the event.

Bears Within Reach Of Title

The University of California was in a position to clinch the southern division Pacific Coast conference basketball title today, but the northern division remained a wide-open race.

The Bears won their seventh consecutive PCC victory without a defeat last night from Southern California 53 to 50.

A California win tonight against UCLA would assure the Bears of no worse than a tie for the crown, and if coupled with a USC defeat by Stanford will give the Berkeley team the championship.

In the northwest, Washington came through in the last minute to topple Washington State, 55 to 50, to pull into a first-place tie with the Cougars.

Approximately 5,800 fans packed the Pullman gym to watch the teams swap the lead nine times before field goals by Sammy White and Bill Vanderburgh led the torrid battle for Washington. Actually, 17 free throws from the foul line gave the game to the Huskies. WSC's center, Vince Hanson, fouled out early in the second half. Jack Nichols was high point man for Washington with 18. WSC led, 26 to 25, at halftime.

OSU Jolted

At Eugene, Oregon jolted Oregon State's title hopes with a 58 to 54 victory, setting the Beavers one-half game behind the leaders.

The Stanford Indians used an airtight zone defense to throttle UCLA's fast break and romp to an easy 55 to 47 win.

Pacific Lutheran was assured of the Washington State Intercollegiate conference crown by dumping Whitworth, 74 to 55.

Junior Varsity 39 To 35 Victor

The Bend junior varsity scored a victory in their Big Six game here last night, defeating the Eugene Jayvees by a score of 39 to 35.

The Eugene five ended the first half with an 18 to 17 lead. The lead shifted several times in the final period before the Lava Bears went ahead near the end of the game. Tom Niebergall added an extra field goal in the final minute of play to provide the Bears with their final points.
