Her appearance here is sponsored by the social studies group of A. A. U., under the direction of Mrs. Don Denning and Mrs. George Simerville. Mrs. Argow was sent to Yale university in the summer of 1947 by the prison association for a six-weeks' period, to observe the series of studies, experiments and lectures conducted there on the alcohol problem.
