

## Nichols Throttled As Golden Bears Win First Game

Berkeley, Calif., March 13 (UP)—California's Golden Bears, using All-conference forward Chuck Hanger at center to battle the scoring threat of towering Jack Nichols, will meet Washington tonight in the second game of the Pacific Coast Conference playoffs.

A victory for California would give the southern division champs the right to represent the Pacific coast in the western N. C. A. A. playoff at Kansas City next week.

The Bears ran wild in the closing minutes last night to down the northern titleholders 64-51, in the first game of the best-two-out-of-three playoff series.

### Nichols Scores Nine Points

Hanger, moved to center to stop Nichols, held the giant pivotman to nine points. Nichols, the conference scoring champion in the regular season, tanked only three field goals and an equal number of free throws under Hanger's watchful eye.

California exploded with 13 points in the last four minutes of the game to break away from the Huskies after they overtook a California lead early in the second half, with the Bears repeatedly coming from behind on backboard control and the scoring punch of Hanger and Andy Wolfe, both all-conference selections, tallied 16 and 15 points respectively.

The Bears led at the half, 30-27. Forward Sammy White, who scored 11 markers, kept the Huskies in the game throughout most of the first half. Nichols was held to a single field goal in the early play.

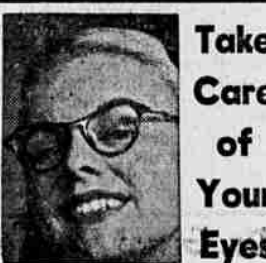

## Umpires To Turn On Field Lights

Los Angeles, March 13 (UP)—Umpires were given authority today to determine when lights should be turned on during night baseball games in the Pacific Coast League.

P. C. L. directors, meeting here yesterday, hit upon this solution to the problem of night games starting during daylight under California daylight saving time.

The board voted to continue last year's player limit allowing a squad members until 30 days after the start of the season when the teams will be cut to 25.

Forfeiture of the franchise and a \$20,000 fine was adopted as punishment for any member club that sells control without approval by a league majority.

A date for the annual summer meeting to be held in Seattle was not chosen.
