

Louis Confident Of Knockout Win Over Jersey Joe

New York, April 13 (UP)—His famed deadpan split by a wide grin, Joe Louis was in high spirits as he stood on the chilly afterdeck of the mighty Queen Elizabeth while she shouldered her way up the Hudson past the statue of liberty.

Back home again after eight weeks abroad in which he gave exhibitions in London and made a trip to Paris, the champ even was undisturbed by a \$500,000 alienation of affections suit filed against him in Chicago.

"Pure nonsense," he grinned. "My lawyers will take care of that."

But then somebody mentioned Jersey Joe Walcott.

And the smiles disappeared.

"I think I'll catch him this time," Joe grunted, tugging viciously at his jaunty green hat.

"I won't name the round, yet, but I'll get him."

"I don't think it will be a hard fight, either," he growled. "The last time I was in shape but I wasn't in top condition. I was dead in the dressing room before the fight. I won't be this time."

You could see that his split decision victory last December 5 had made a deep wound in the Louis pride. So much so that there is a possibility, despite his reiteration that he'll retire after this one, that he may fight again.

"I said before I'd retire after this one," Louis explained. "But they told me in London that doesn't mean anything."

Revenge Comes First

Revenge is uppermost in the brown bomber's mind. Knocking out Walcott, and quickly, amounts almost to fanaticism. The mention of the only man who ever made him look bad had ruined his homecoming.

So there were fewer and more feeble smiles as he plotted his itinerary, which includes signing for the fight Wednesday; doing preliminary training at a friend's farm near Kalamazoo, Mich., and finishing up at Pompton lakes for the June 23 return bout.

"I'm not thinking of anything else after that," he said slowly as he trudged down the promenade deck and watched the slowly passing New York skyline.

New York Giants Get Bob Newsom

Tulsa, Okla., April 13 (UP)—The New York Giants, casting about for new pitching talent, came up today with the "old man river" of the major leagues—a 39-year-old Louis Norman (Bob) Newsom.

Beavers To Face Hollywood Stars

San Francisco, April 13 (UP)—The Pacific coast league baseball comes to four more cities today and tomorrow with official season openers in San Francisco, Seattle and Los Angeles.

With interest in the national pastime on the upswing all the way around the circuit, something over 60,000 fans—weather permitting—will see the battles.

Seattle Rainiers play host to the Oakland A's in the north country and expect 15,000 for the opener this afternoon. Portland entertains the Hollywood Stars tomorrow afternoon with at least 10,000 expected. In the south San Francisco takes on San Diego and Los Angeles meets Sacramento tonight.

100,000 Mark Nears
With the 60,000 expected tonight added to the 45,000 opening night in the other four cities of the circuit, it will bring the total for openers to well over the 100,000 mark.

Meanwhile, the league race in a short two weeks has developed into a free-for-all.

The top-place San Francisco team is only four and one-half games ahead of the bottom-rung Seattle entry. And there is only one game separating the Seals from San Diego with Sacramento another half-game behind. It is only two and one-half games from the top of the heap to the seventh-place Portland and Oakland clubs.

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Lava Bear Team In Area Meet

The Lava Bear track team will enter its first competition of the season this afternoon in a three-way meet against the Prineville Cowboys and Madras White Buffaloes at Prineville.

The meet will be the first of the 1948 season for each of the three schools and coaches will be surprised if any fast times result in the races. The coldest spring in many years has hindered track practices and only a few good workouts have been possible.

Merlin Rodman, outstanding Madras athlete, is expected to dominate the dash events, while Bill Sheffield, of Bend, is expected to lead in the pole vault field. Most of the other events will be rated as toss-ups.

Coach Bud Robertson has selected a 29-man team to attend the meet, but not all of the boys will be entered. It is planned to have only one boy entered in each event.

San Francisco, April 13 (UP)—Don Ross, the slugging third baseman of the Hollywood Stars, fattened his batting average off San Francisco Seal pitchers last week to take over the Pacific coast league hitting leadership with a mark of .477.

Ross has 21 base knocks in 44 trips to the plate while appearing in 12 games for the best average among the regulars.

Teammate Frank Kelleher leads the loop in run-batted-in with 19, and big Jack Graham of the San Diego Padres tops the home run sluggers with six in 14 tilts.
