An appreciative audience of Bend music lovers enthusiastically received Elizabeth C. Krueger, noted contralto from the San Francisco area, who was presented in recital Sunday afternoon at the Allen school auditorium.

Mrs. Krueger's rich, beautifully-trained voice, of operatic calibre, was completely controlled. Her amazing range and volume, and her flawless technique, were glorified by the intense devotion that typifies her work.

Mrs. Allan Philip was at the piano and played musically accompaniments with her usual artistry and sensitive touch.

In response to generous applause, Mrs. Krueger sang two encores at the end of the program, including the familiar "Ave Maria" by Schubert. Audience favorites were Rimsky-Korsakoff's dramatic "Song of the Bells," sung without accompaniment, and "Loving Before the Savior," by Bach. Four beautiful songs of Richard Strauss were also much to the liking of the audience, and the poignant aria from Debussy's

"L'Enfant Prodiges" was sung with fine tone and given a splendid interpretation.

After the recital, a reception honoring the artist was given in the parlors of First Presbyterian church, by members of the Come-Double club, sponsors of the concert.
