San Francisco, May 15 (UP)—After a 10-day sojourn in the Pacific Coast league cellar, the Portland Beavers were on their way back up the ladder today—maybe.

The Bevos scaled the cellar stairs last night by blanking San Diego 7 to 0 while the Seattle Rainiers were winning both ends of a double-header from Sacramento, 4 to 3 and 6 to 3. The dual loss dunked the Solons into last place.

San Francisco pulled another heart-breaker out of the Hollywood hat, 6 to 5, with a three-run spurt in the last of the eighth that marked the Stars as the hard-luck club of 1948.

Oakland Evens Series
In the evening's other contest Oakland evened the series score with Los Angeles, bunting six runs in the sixth frame to win 9 to 3.

Vince Deblasi was the proud father of the shut-out at Portland, giving up only four hits and striking out eight batters for his fifth win of the season. He went seven innings before giving up a hit. Xavier Rescigno was tagged with San Diego's loss.

In both games at Seattle the Rainiers relied on a big inning for the victory margin. They punched across three runs on five singles to come from behind in the sixth and win the opener. In the nightcap five Suds crossed the plate in the fifth, three of them on a homer by Kenny Richardson. Herman Besse received credit for the first game win although he had help from Steve Peek. Johnny Gorsica lasted the full nine in the second game, giving up 12 hits. Earl Rapp also homered for Seattle.

Hollywood had a 5 to 3 margin going into the last of the eighth at San Francisco when Hugh Luby lashed out his fifth homer of the season with none on. A few minutes later Dixie Howell singled in two runs to tie up the game and win it. Pinky Woods was knocked from the mound in that inning and Gordon Maltzberger finished it. Dewey Soriano chalked up the Seal win after relieving Cliff Melton in the eighth. The victory clinched the series for San Francisco in four straight games. Frank Kelleher hit his 11th homer for the Stars in the top of the eighth.

Oakland's big, six-run inning was the pay-off on three walks and five singles and sent losing pitcher Fred Shmidt to the showers. Floyd (Hummingbird) Speer got credit for the win.
