

### Forester Named To Head K.O.G.

Albert Wiesendanger, for 39 years identified with Mt. Hood national forest in important executive capacities, on June 1 becomes executive secretary of Keep Oregon Green association, according to Dean Paul M. Dunn, state chairman of the fire prevention organization.

Wiesendanger has earned a national reputation for his years of work in forestry, in fire protection and in forest recreation. Dean Dunn said. A native Portlander, he is known to thousands of Oregonians who have visited Mt. Hood during the past four decades. He has lectured to two generations of students in schools throughout the northwest on forest recreation and protection themes.

"Secretary Wiesendanger steps into this important post at one of the most critical forest fire periods in our history," Dunn stated. "His first undertaking will be to visit every county KOG committee and lay plans to combat man-caused fires this summer. Citizens of Oregon are urged to give complete cooperation again this year, for fire hazards are greater than ever."

**Establishes Reputation**

"Albert Wiesendanger has made an enviable reputation for himself during his long years of continuous service to forestry," H. J. Andrews, regional U. S. forester said. "His educational work among students and adults has been of the highest order. His new post with KOG will give him an even broader opportunity to serve Oregon."

Wiesendanger attended Couch school and Lincoln high school in Portland and took University of Oregon extension courses. He is a senior member of the Society of American Foresters. He was senior forest ranger at Eagle Creek from 1916 to 1939, principal forest ranger at Timberline Lodge from 1939 to 1941 and has been district ranger at Columbia gorge in recent years. He will make his headquarters at the KOG offices at Salem. Wiesendanger succeeds Charles Ogle, secretary for the past three years, who has resigned to take up other work in Oregon.
