

Williams Victor Over Beau Jack; Bout Is Onesided

Philadelphia, July 13 (UP)—Lightweight champion Ike Williams planned a vacation in Europe today as a self-reward for giving challenger Beau Jack the worst beating of his career by stopping him in the sixth round.

Beau, the ex-champion who suffered a technical knockout at 33 seconds of the sixth at Shibe park last night, decided to return to the welterweight division. He was convinced that paring down to the lightweight limit of 135 pounds robbed him of stamina.

In Fast Flight

Until Beau ran out of current last night he electrified 12,925 fans by fighting in the hell-for-leather style that enabled him twice in the past to win New York state's version of the lightweight crown. He won the first three rounds.

After that, the bull-shouldered little negro from Augusta, Ga., faded until he was battered into helplessness on the ropes in a neutral corner in the sixth round.

Referee Charley Daggert stopped the bout. He might have intervened a few seconds earlier, when the usually dead-panned Williams implored him with gestures to step in.

Ike was reluctant to continue punishing the nearly unconscious challenger, who apparently could not fall to the canvas because the corner ropes held him up.

No Cash Made

Last night each principal weighed 134 pounds, one under the lightweight limit.

The bout, scheduled for 15 rounds, was entertaining while it lasted; but it probably lost money for promoter Herman Taylor. It's gross gate was a disappointing \$83,787. When Taylor made the match, he hoped for a gate of between \$125,000 and \$150,000.

Williams was guaranteed \$30,000 for making his second defense of the undisputed crown he won last August by knocking out Bob Montgomery. Beau Jack received 22 1/2 per cent of the net gate, or approximately \$13,500.

Bulletin Youngsters Topple Jaycees in Softball Upset

Many things happened in Junior league softball play last night, but what proved to be the most exciting thing of the evening was when The Bend Bulletin youngsters provided the league with its biggest upset since the season began, toppling the tough Jaycees 15-8 in a free-swinging battle royal.

Capitol Cleaners came up with some more of the evening's excitement in their game, tying the league's high scoring record held by the Jaycees in last place Gregg's Bakery, 28-4.

The other game turned out to be an upset, too, Slate's fast improving ball team drubbing City Cleaners 12-7.

Chuck Mills, Bulletin hurler, tamed his speed, although he walked nine, to set a new league strike-out record of seven. The old record was held by Anderson of City Cleaners with six.

The Bulletin boys batted all the way around and then some in the first frame, getting five runs on five hits, one of which was a three-run homer by infielder George Van Sickle.

The Jaycees scored once in the third and then five times in the fourth inning on just one hit to take a 6-5 lead. The Bulletin then proceeded to make a farce of the game in their half of the fourth, scoring ten times on four hits.

Capitol Cleaners had two big innings in its game but they didn't need either one of them, for they scored the winning runs in the first two innings. In the initial frame they scored four runs on one hit, then scored two runs on two hits in the second.

The winners scored 11 runs in both the third and fourth stanzas to tie the league record of 28 runs.

Bill Whaley, Capitol catcher, clubbed out two home runs and two singles in four official trips to the plate for a perfect evening. His second homer was grand slam, coming with the sacks loaded. He drove in a total of seven runs with his four hits.

The vote for "Most punished player of the week" would surely go to third baseman Smith of Gregg's this week, for in each of three trips to the plate he was hit by the pitcher.

In the Gregg's team third inning, a bit of confusion resulted on a fly ball, and the Capitol Cleaners team successfully engineered a triple play.

In last night's opener, Slate's, which draws the nod as the most improved ball team, threw an iron-clad defense into the faces of City Cleaners, Tom Ray letting them down with four hits.

Freco Ray provided a great deal of Slate's battling power, driving in four runs with a grand slam homer in the third inning.

Each team made a double play, Jim Wade getting an unassisted twin killing in the second for City Cleaners, and Slate's coming up with a beauty in which infielder Sigmund made both outs although needing an assist.

In tonight's first battle, sixth place, which is now unoccupied, will be filled, for the two teams presently tied for fifth place, Jess's Pastime and Redmond Safeway, are scheduled to meet.

In the second tilt, West Side Tavern will still be trying for its first win, but again Tavernmen have to face a tough crew, George Childs' Hardware. However, West Side has beaten Childs', but it was in exhibition play and did not count in league standings.

Johnny Barrett Boosts Average

San Francisco, July 13 (UP)—Johnny Barrett, San Diego Padre outfielder, boosted his Pacific Coast league batting mark to .378 during the past week to increase his leadership to 20 points over his closest rival, Lou Stringer of the Hollywood Stars.

Barrett and Stringer lead the full-time regulars, but Gene Woodling, San Francisco fly-chaser returned to active duty after six weeks on the sidelines with a broken ankle, and immediately took up where he left off in the hitting department. Appearing in six games he upped his average from .381 to .397—but hasn't appeared in enough games to be counted a regular.

Four Scratches Give Nationals Big Opportunity

St. Louis, July 13 (UP)—Four late scratches from the American league lineup presented a golden victory opportunity to the underdog Nationals in today's All-Star game at Sportsman park.

Manager Bucky Harris of the American announced the withdrawal of Thumpin' Ted Williams of Boston, Joe Di Maggio of New York and George Kell of Detroit. Kell's teammate, Pitcher Hal Newhouser, had declared himself out earlier with a sore arm.

Williams Departs

Williams' departure was the biggest blow to the 35,000 fans expected to attend the 15th renewal of the inter-league strife. They had expected to see Ted, a lean and lithe hitting machine, engage in a swat duel with Stan Musial of the Nationals. Williams has racked up a big .388 at the plate.

But the Nationals, smarting under a miserable 10-4 mark against them in previous engagements, found renewed hope in Harris' need to open with substitutes at left, center and third base and to replace his intended starting pitcher.

Vic Raschi of the New York Yankees and Ralph "the Hawk" Branca of the Brooklyn Dodgers, were slated to open on the mound. Raschi has won 10 and lost three and Branca has a 10-6 mark. Both are right-handers.

Harris said that Williams' injury, a separated cartilage on his left side, had not responded to treatment. He added that DiMaggio, ailing with a badly swollen left knee, would be available for pinch-hitting duty but Kell, with an injured ankle, was out entirely.

The trio will be replaced by Tommy Henrich of New York in left, Hoot Evers of Detroit in center, and Ken Keltner of Cleveland at third.
