14 Jet Fighters Reach Labrador

Goose Bay, Labrador, July 13 (AP)—Fourteen U. S. Shooting Star jet fighters take off today for Greenland where they will rendezvous with six British Vampire jets in the first such trans-Atlantic crossing by the speedy planes.

The squadron of U. S. air force F-80's arrived here last night after flying the 800 miles from Dow air base, Bangor, Me., in a little more than two hours. Two of the 16 planes that started the flight from Selfridge field, Mich., were left behind in Bangor for mechanical repairs.

British Head West
The British group, which is bound for Montreal and then New York to take part in an air show dedicating the opening of Lido field International airport July 31, arrived in Keflavik, Iceland, at 1 p.m. yesterday.

After a flight of 600 miles from Stornoway, Scotland, air force officers said the flight of the combat-equipped U. S. planes to Germany was purely a training flight. The jets are scheduled for two weeks of exercises in Germany.

World war II ace Lt. Col. David Schilling, of Traverse City, Mich., the flight commander, said his planes cruised at an average of 400 to 420 miles an hour during the flight from Dow field.

Fifteen Years Ago

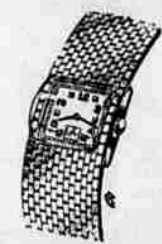

Fort Lewis Gets New Army Chief

Fort Lewis, Wash., July 13 (AP)—Maj. Gen. Harry J. Collins, former commander of the U. S. zone in Austria, arrived here today to assume command of this huge military post.

Gen. Collins was relieved of his command in Austria on June 11 by Maj. Gen. Ira P. Swift, who commanded here until Collins arrived. He will probably resume his former duties as assistant commander of the 2nd Infantry division.

Strength at the post is scheduled to quadruple after another two months. There are about 7,500 men here at present but the army have authorized an additional 22,000, to start coming in about the first of October.
