San Francisco, Aug. 13 (AP) — Friday the thirteenth arrived a few minutes ahead of schedule for the San Francisco Seals last night to prove that no baseball game is over until the final out.

Lefty O'Doul and his San Francisco Seals had victory all but chalked up in the league records as the third game in a crucial Pacific Coast league series entered the ninth frame.

Then fatal Friday entered the picture and Oakland's pennant sniffling Acoms tallied six times to defeat the league leaders 11 to 9 in one of the most unprofessional games of the season.

The win brought the Oaks, famous for their last-minute drives, to within two games of loop lead. Seven pitchers saw action in the three-hour comedy of errors.

Beavers Win 6-3
Portland stretched a winning streak to six games by downing the staggering San Diego Padres 6 to 3 on the four-hit hurling of Vince Dibiassi. It was the Ports fourth straight win over the Pads and moved them within one-half game of fifth place.

A double by Ted Davis and singles by Cliff Cameron and Lou Stringer provided Hollywood with its two-run final frame spurt as Rugger Adriaola chalked up his 11th win. Japhet (Red) Lynn was charged with his seventh loss.

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Salem, Aug. 13 (AP)—Two Lewiston, Ida., golfers today held first place in the annual Pacific northwest pro-amateur tournament which ended here yesterday.

Professional Bill Welch and amateur Bud Hofmeister took over the pro-amateur championship yesterday after racking up a 69 to go with the 13-under-par 59 they turned in Wednesday.

Welch took the biggest share of a \$1,500 purse. The Idaho duo came out only one stroke ahead of Frank Newell and Jack Walters of Tacoma, and Dick Haskell and Jim Mallory of Seattle.

Two teams also tied at 130—Larry Lamberger and Lew Jennings of Portland and Al Zimmerman and Bud Haskell of Portland.

Tied at 131 were Sid Harmon and Jim Shriver of Walla Walla, Woody Lamb and Jim Bushong of Bend, and ending champion Emery Zimmerman and Ray Weston, Jr., Portland and Spokane.

Four other teams with 133's got a hand in the money belt. They are Joe Steiger and Jimmy Sheldon, both of Salem; Ed (Porky) Oliver and Erv Parent of Seattle; Harold West and Gene Bates of Tualatin, Ore., and Dave Killen and Duke Mathews of Olympia.

Marvin (Bud) Ward and Roy Moe, his pro partner, finished with a 137.
