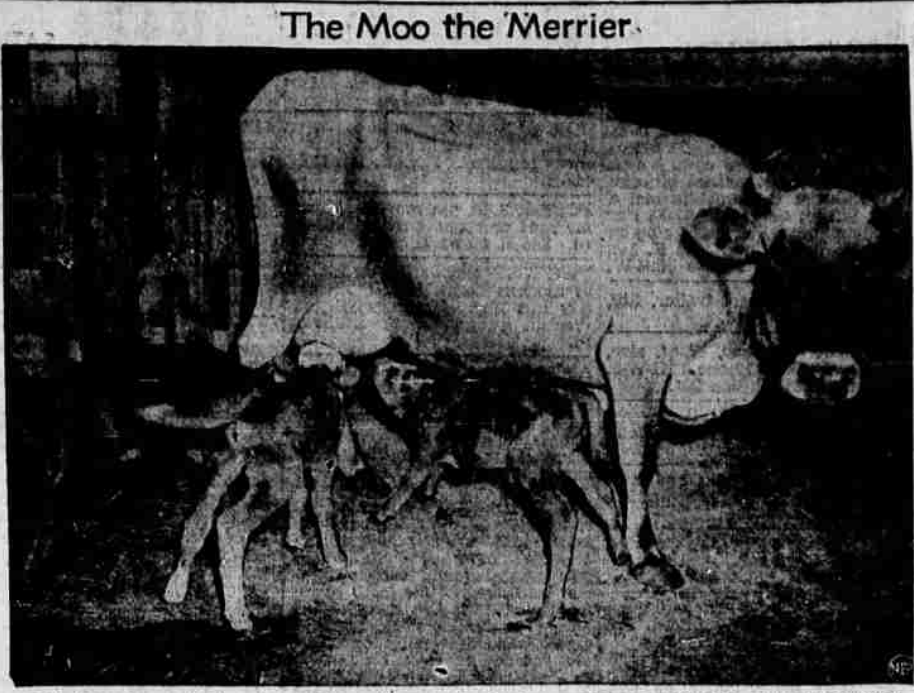

Limit Applies To Income Taxes

Salem, Aug. 21 (AP)—Oregon's constitutional six per cent limitation applies to personal income and corporation excise taxes because they are used to reduce the tax levy and not to decrease the amount of funds needed before the levy is determined, an analysis of a supreme court ruling showed today.

Chief Justice George Rossman of the Oregon supreme court made this point in his opinion ruling that income taxes can be applied only to reduce property taxes.

The question of whether or not the six per cent limitation applies to income and corporate excise taxes has been a long-standing controversy that has plagued legislators, tax officials and taxpayers. This is the first time it has been definitely settled by the high court. The limitation is in an amendment to the state constitution adopted in 1916. It limits a tax levy to not more than six per cent over the amount of taxes levied in any one of three preceding years.

Explains Opinion
This is how Justice Rossman explains his opinion that the limitation applies to income taxes. The law describing the manner in which the tax commission must determine state's fiscal needs requires the commission first to prepare a tabulated statement showing all items of expense.

From the total of this tabulation is deducted money in the treasury not applied by law to some special purpose. This money generally is known as "miscellaneous receipts."
The battleground in the suit was whether or not surplus income taxes are miscellaneous receipts. The high court, in Rossman's opinion, held that the surplus is not miscellaneous receipts, but is "applied by law for some special purpose," namely to reduce property taxes.

Consequently, income tax money available for offsetting purposes is deducted from the amount of the tax levy and not from the commission's tabulation of needs before miscellaneous receipts are subtracted.

Axis Sally Faces Treason Charge

Washington, Aug. 21 (AP)—Mildred Elizabeth Gillars, who allegedly sought to spread discontent among American troops while broadcasting as "Axis Sally" over the wartime Nazi radio, was charged with treason against her native land.

Miss Gillars, gray-haired 47-year-old spinster, was returned here today from Frankfurt, Germany, and immediately arraigned on the treason charge before a U. S. commissioner.
She was held without bond and sent to the District of Columbia jail to await a preliminary hearing on Aug. 31.

U. S. commissioner Cyril S. Lawrence read the formal complaint charging Miss Gillars.

Officers Studying Crash of B-29

Rapid City S. D., Aug. 21 (AP) Air force officers today investigated the crash of a B-29 which ploughed into the ground on a take off and killed its 17 crew members and passengers.

The huge ship crashed and burned 500 yards from the end of the runway yesterday at the start of a routine training flight.
Bodies of the victims, mostly "new" B-29 crewmen, were badly charred. Medical officers found it difficult to identify them.

Capt. Tom Segler, public relations officer, said the plane dipped its left wing as it raced along the runway, nosed over, and then plunged to the ground.
The ship plunged over on its back when it hit the ground and burst into flames.
