Preview Held For 1949 Car

The first private showing of 1949 Nash cars, entirely new from bumper to bumper and strikingly advanced in design, was given to more than 300 Nash dealers in the San Francisco region, W. B. Anderson, of the Anderson Nash Co. of Bend reported today on his return from the bay city. The special dealers' preview was held at the regional sales meeting on Sept. 14. While the new Nash models, known as the "Airlite" series, will not be made public until October 22, the private dealer preview was held to acquaint them with features of the new car, said to be outstanding in styling, comfort, performance, safety and economy. First public showing of the cars in Bend will be made next month, Anderson said. "The new Nash is a postwar 'dream car,'" he declared. Anderson said the new models represent more than five years of research, designing, engineering and testing at proving grounds with hundreds of thousands of miles of road testing behind them. At the meeting, H. C. Doss, vice president in charge of sales, told dealers that the new Nash represents an investment of about \$15,000,000 and is far in advance of any car heretofore offered by the company. The date for the local showing of the new Nash has been set for October 22, Anderson announced today.
