Chemawa School Enrolls Navajos

Salem, Sept. 21 (AP)—About 100 Navajo Indian students were enrolled at the Chemawa Indian school north of here yesterday.

It was the first group of Navajos who will be sent here by the federal government for education from their reservations in New Mexico and Arizona.

Many of the Navajos will receive their first acquaintance with the English language. Indian schools throughout the west are beginning to take the Navajos as students, because the Navajo reservations have facilities for only 5,000 of the 17,000 school children there.

Chemawa school superintendent R. M. Kelley said this year's enrollment will be about 500, an all-time high. Most other students at the school are orphans or from communities where public schools are not available.

Auto Makers Have Two-Year Backlog

St. Louis, Sept. 21 (AP)—Benjamin Ford, vice president of the Ford Motor company, said last night that it will be two years before the auto industry can catch up with its backlog of orders.

Addressing employees at the dedication of a new Lincoln-Mercury plant near here, Ford said that the orders for higher priced cars may be filled sooner.

Ford asserted, however, that the company had a backlog of more than 2,000,000 orders for Fords.

"We don't expect to meet the demands for Ford at least until 1951," he said.

Elk Moved Into Cascade Area Portland, Sept. 21 (AP)—State game commission agents have trapped and successfully "transported" five head of elk from Coos county to the Cascade mountains in Douglas county, Game supervisor C. A. Lockwood said today.

Lockwood said Leslie Zumwalt, south coast district agent, caught the elk in a complaint area and aided in taking them two days later to the Cascades.

Zumwalt reported the operation successful because of a delay in loading. He said he was able to overcome the "initial extreme fright" of the animals before moving them to the new range.

Indonesia Rejects Dutch Aid Offer Batavia, Sept. 21 (AP)—The Indonesian republic, preparing for a military drive against communists who staged a successful coup against the city of Madjoen on Java, have rejected an offer of Dutch aid, the republican radio reported today.

The Antara news agency reported the young republic considered the communist foothold in Madjoen as purely an internal matter.

Premier Mohammad Hatta was reported to have said Indonesia would not tolerate any "meddling" by the Dutch.

The offer of Dutch collaboration was made in Washington by the Dutch foreign minister.

False Benefit Claims Defrauding States Washington (AP)—Americans are swindling their state governments out of thousands of dollars every year through fraudulent employment benefit claims, according to the Interstate Conference of Employment Security Agencies.

While intentionally false claims amount to less than one-half of one per cent of the total, the conference said, the annual dollar take is large.

Intensified anti-fraud drives, greater publicity and swift punishment are catching more and more of the swindlers and discouraging others, the report said.

The conference is an organization of state unemployment insurance and employment service administrators.

Daylight Time Will End on September 26

Bend, with the rest of the nation, other than California, will turn its clocks back one hour Sunday midnight, Sept. 26, under provisions of a city resolution adopted last May 28.

The resolution provided that "all clocks owned and controlled by the city of Bend by which working hours are governed be set ahead one hour" on June 1. Sept. 26 was set as the termination date for daylight saving, to conform with time changes in Portland and Seattle.

Radio stations will also leave the daylight saving schedule Sunday midnight, with the exception of those in California. Some Oregon cities, including Klamath Falls, went off daylight saving time earlier in the month.

Bend residents are being advised to turn their clocks back one hour when they go to bed Sunday night, to start the Monday workday under the standard time schedule.
