

Nevada Wolf Pack In Grid Spotlight After 3 Contests

New York, Oct. 13 (UP)—The University of Nevada Wolf Pack, unbeaten in three starts, today occupied the spotlight as the nation's top power-packed outfit.

The Rocky Mountain crew, coached by Joe Sheeketski, a former Notre Dame great, rolled up 1,566 yards in its first three contests, for an average of 522 yards per game.

Nevada also led in the forward passing offense, released by the National Collegiate Athletic bureau. The Pack, paced by its brilliant halfback, Stan Heath, totaled 798 yards in the air, averaging a flat 266 yards per game. Heath, who ranks as the nation's top passer, has racked up 425 yards on 43 completions in 62 attempts.

Pressed by Wyoming

Wyoming was closest to Nevada in the total offense figures, pouring on 1,430 yards in three games for a 476.7 average.

Then came little Miami of Ohio with a 441.3 average, followed by Maryland with a 421.3 mark, and Columbia, 409.3. Rounding out the "Big Ten" were Army, 398.3; California, 386.5; Oklahoma, 376.3; Oregon, 362.5; Lafayette, 362.3.

With Jim Finks doing most of the pitching, Tulsa managed to pull into the runner-up spot in the forward passing records with 629 yards gained overhead for a 209.7 average. William and Mary was third with a 190.3 mark, followed by West Virginia, 179.0; and Columbia, 178.7.

Army Defense Good

Army, looking up with each succeeding game, boasted the best defense on the ground. The Cadets have rambled for 1,083 yards in three games, averaging a flat 361 yards per contest.

Wyoming also was second in this department, rushing for 1,043 yards in three games and a 347.7 average. Maryland held third with 339 yards gained overhead per game. Texas Mines was fourth with a 307.7 average, followed by Oklahoma, 294.7.

In the scoring records, Wyoming was far in front with 149 points in three games. California's Golden Bears was second in the nation with 122, followed by Arkansas, 120; Lafayette, 116, and Nevada, Kansas, 113 each.

Teams Roll Along

An interesting sidelight in the forward passing records showed that Drake and Penn were rolling along without a single interception. Drake pitchers heaved 58 aeriels without hitting an opponent while Penn's record showed 42 attempts and no interceptions.

In the individual statistics, Jim Walthall of West Virginia was second to Heath in total offense with 626 yards. Lindy Berry of Texas Christian accounted for 618 yards to hold down third place, while Clyde (Smackover) Scott, brilliant Olympic performer from Arkansas, held fourth with 556 yards. Walker Jones of Wyoming was fifth with 535.

Scott also stood out as the nation's best in rushing with 453 yards in 54 cracks at opposing lines.

TO MANAGE ANGELS

Los Angeles, Oct. 13 (UP)—Tall, taciturn Bill Kelly today had a contract to manage the Los Angeles Angels for the third straight year.

President Don Stewart of the Pacific Coast league club announced yesterday the signing of Kelly, who piloted the Angels to the league pennant in his first year at the helm in 1947. The Angels finished third this season.

Hank Greenberg, the great home run hitter who stepped down as a player last season, will be the new president of the Cleveland Indians, replacing Bill Veeck. That comes from the usual reliable source.

They say in the home of the new world champions of baseball that Greenberg now owns controlling stock in the club and while he isn't tiffing with Veeck, he has the golden haired promoter ticketed out. Certainly the head greeter in Cleveland was Greenberg now a vice president, with president Veeck taking a rear seat in the festivities.

The Pacific coast ice hockey league made its professional debut last night with three rough contests that saw a total of 186 minutes in penalties meted out.

In the northern division the Tacoma Rockets started the season on the right foot by downing the Portland Eagles 7-4 on five last period goals. The two clubs amassed 84 minutes in the cooler. Referees and Tuten and Bill Cook gave out three misconduct penalties and two five minute raps for fighting.

Canucks Defeated

In the other northern division game the champion Vancouver Canucks lost their opener to Seattle's Ironmen 5-3. The contest was highlighted by two last period fights as the Tams drew 60 minutes in penalties, 42 of them in the last frame.

The southern division's only game was a 4-4 draw between the Fresno Falcons and the Los Angeles Monarchs. The two squads battled through the regulation time and a 10-minute overtime period without gaining a decision. The clubs were charged with 42 minutes in penalties.
