

"Flower Pot" Hats Latest Brain Wave Of Paris Milliners

Paris (UP)—Some Paris hats this season look just like flower pots. They are meant to.

I have made a tour of a few of Paris' leading millinery designers and have uncovered three alarming trends: the flower pot, the lamp shade and the poke bonnet.

Up at Paulette's swank hat maison what did I discover? A brick red "what'sit" that looked for all the world like a common garden flower pot, brick red with a hole in the top.

I asked Paulette herself about it. She popped into secret "creating rooms" in back and brought out a flower pot covered in canvas.

Clocks Are Popular

"Of course I change the base of the flower pot and add a few gray feathers for contrast," she said. "If you have a big head, that's it."

Paulette and her flower pot are the latest launchers of the most popular hat style here now, the cloche. Although she makes the real flower pot hat in brick felt, she changes the crown and material and color on others, still keeping the same line to create a cloche that hugs the head and sticks up in back with a slightly pointed crown.

Another important shape this winter is the revolutionary lamp shade. Like the flower pot, it has two tiers, but is worn tipped toward the front and slightly to the right. Simone Cange, one of Paris' outstanding designers of new shapes, is responsible for the lamp shade.

Her favorite colors this season are pearly gray, off-green tones and beige. Often the lamp shades have a dangling black tassel on the right.

Bulk Is Keynote

Bulk is a keynote in the lamp shade hats. The crowns are large, and often six inches high. They are set into a wide band which gives the wearer a definite 1920 look, as the hats are worn well down on the forehead.

The third shape of 1949 is the half-bonnet of Maud Roser. A little plaid hat, for example, is really two fat sausages sewn together sideways, which are worn on top of the head. They're rounded to fit the crown, of course, and although off the thing looks ridiculous, on it's cute.
