Combs Flat Road Bids Received

Low bid on the Prineville-Eagle rock section of the Paulina secondary highway, also known as the Combs flat road, was submitted by T. W. Thomas, Portland, when proposals were received by the state highway commission yesterday in Portland. The Thomas bid for the work was \$54,012. The project involves 4.63 miles of roadbed widening and 15.93 miles of rock or gravel surfacing.

The Combs flat road will provide access to a large body of timber in the Maury mountain section, and will also provide an all-year short route to the Paulina country for ranchers in eastern Crook county. Maury mountain timber will be milled in Prineville. The rock-surfaced road will be over the route of a road originally constructed by Crook county as a shortcut to the upper Crooked river valley. This shortcut bypasses curves and grades on the Crooked river highway between Prineville and Post.

Cooperative Agreements
A few years ago, the road was extensively improved under a cooperative agreement with the Ochoco Lumber Co., with the county providing part of the funds and the lumber company the rest. The present project also involves cooperative agreements, with the county using forest service receipts for its share of the cost and with the Pine Products corporations and other lumber firms logging in that area assisting in the financing.

The forest service recently completed a new bridge over Crooked river to give access to the Maury district, where Pine Products is building access roads into the timber areas.

At its Monday meeting, the highway commission also received bids for construction of a maintenance building at Lapine, Archie R. Arerill, Portland, submitted the low bids, \$14,454 and \$13,627, on each of two alternates.

School Music Groups to Appear

Bend high school's annual Christmas present to the community, an extensive and elaborate music program, was by today all "wrapped up" and ready to be delivered tomorrow evening. The show, under the general supervision of musical director Don P. Pence, will be presented with no charge to the public at 8 p.m. tomorrow in the high school gymnasium.

Almost all musical units at the high school will take part in the program, including the high school orchestra, the junior high choir, the junior high girls' glee club, the senior high boys' quartette, the senior high band, the senior high girls' sextette, the a cappella choir, and the senior high choir.

The program is as follows: High school orchestra: "Christmas Fantasy" and "Angelus" from "Scenes Pittoresques." The orchestra will be assisted by Fred Dallas.

Junior high choir: "Today There Is Ringing," "Alleluia" and "Santa Claus Is Coming to Town." An accompanist will be Christine Ryman.

Junior high girls' glee club: "Jingle Bells" and "Lullaby of the Christ Child."

Senior high boys' quartet: "God Rest Ye Merry Gentlemen." Senior high band: "If Thou Be Near" and "White Christmas," with tenor solo by Mickey Sullivan.

Senior high girls' sextet: "Let It Snow."

A cappella choir: "Carol of the Birds," and "Twas the Night Before Christmas." Arita Nelson will be accompanist.

Senior high choir and a cappella choir: "The Holy City." Accompanist will be Diane MacKenzie.

Senior high band and choirs: "The Christmas Story," narrated by Paul Rhoads and Charleen Dahlin; "Silent Night"; "O Little Town of Bethlehem," solo by Mickey Sullivan; "It Came Upon a Midnight Clear"; "Away in a Manger," a duet by Kitty Moore and Charleen Dahlin; "Hark! The Herald Angels Sing"; "The First Noel"; "O Holy Night," solo by Kitty Moore; "O Come All Ye Faithful"; "We Three Kings of the Orient Are," mixed quartette, and the finale, "Joy to the World."

This program, with minor changes, will be presented to the student body at an assembly Wednesday afternoon.
