Washington, March 9 (AP)—House democratic leader John W. McCormack announced today that the house will take up a 15-month rent control extension bill tomorrow.

McCormack told the house he hoped the 15-month bill will be passed by late Friday.

Republicans lined up to fight any administration attempt to extend controls for more than 90 days.

Republican leader Joseph W. Martin, Jr., of Massachusetts, said GOP house members are solidly behind a move by Rep. Jesse P. Wolcott, R., Mich., to turn rent controls over to the states after a three-month extension of the federal law.

Earthquake Jars Frisco Bay Area

San Francisco, March 9 (AP)—A sharp earthquake jarred millions of Californians awake in the San Francisco bay region today and caused some minor damage in shattered window panes, dishes and broken water pipes.

There were no injuries reported although the quake rattled windows like drums beating, tumbled canned goods and dishes from shelves and was felt distinctly in a 200-mile area.

The tremor was recorded at 4:29:10 a.m. (PST) and lasted about 30 seconds. It apparently centered on the San Andreas fault, the long earth flaw which cleaves California from the Oregon border to Mexico and was responsible for the historic San Francisco earthquake of April 18, 1906.

Normally deserted downtown streets in San Francisco were filled with hundreds of curious persons who dressed hastily and dashed outside to see if the shocks caused noticeable damage.

England's King To Get Operation
London, March 9 (AP)—Buckingham palace sources believed today that King George VI forced his physicians into the decision to operate on his nerve in his right leg in hopes of improving circulation in the main artery.

They said the king had been impatient at his slow recovery under the present form of treatment and had insisted that court doctors take more definite action.

The king's impatience, palace sources said, was explained by the rigors of the treatment he has been undergoing for the past few months.

Each day, they said, his arms and legs have been encased in electrically heated gloves and stockings. He has had to sit for hours at a time with his limbs outstretched.

Search for Plane Reported Futile

Eugene, March 9 (AP)—Lt. D. L. Copenhaver of McChord air force base, Wash., said today that all leads in the search for a light private plane missing since March 1 have proved futile, but the air and ground search will continue in the Cascade and Coast range mountain country near Eugene.

Lt. Copenhaver, in charge of search operations, said the search would go on for at least two weeks more before hope is abandoned of finding the plane piloted by Frank Hulne of San Mateo, Cal., and believed to have his brother, Bill Hulne, aboard. The plane left Kelo, Wash., March 1 for Sacramento and was last reported over Medford, Ore., but CAA officials expressed belief Hulne did not get that far south, and the search was concentrated in the Eugene area.
