

# Roosevelt Downs Marshfield Five To Take Tourney

Eugene, March 21 (AP)—Roosevelt of Portland held the Oregon state high school class A basketball championship today.

But Marshfield of Coos Bay, the team the Teddies beat, 62-50, Saturday night to win the state title, served notice of a strong bid for next year's crown.

**Three Named**  
Three of the five first all-state quintet picked by coaches and officials of the 31st annual Oregon prep class A tourney, were Marshfield men. And two of the three will be back in play next season.

Saturday night's title tussle on McArthur court here was close most of the way. Roosevelt led by just two points, 14-12, at the first period. The Teddies were in front only four points at the half, 31-27. Then slowly they stretched their lead to 44-37 at the third period and won going away.

**Bergman High**  
Roosevelt center Lloyd Bergman was high scorer with 19 points. Center John Huggins, guard Ron Robins and guard Terry McCullough were high point men for Marshfield with 11 each.

Robins was a sensation of the tournament and the title clash. Only 14 years old and a sophomore, he has two more years at Marshfield. He is among the youngest players ever to gain all-state honors. Barney Holland of Marshfield, another of the all-state five, is a junior, so has another season with the Pirates. The third Marshfield man to make the all-state quintet is John Huggins, who graduates in June.

Others of the all-state five include Jim Winters, Roosevelt star, and Doug Hogland of Bend.

## Semi-Pro League Officers Elected

Albany, March 21 (AP)—President James W. Jenks, Albany, and all other officers were re-elected yesterday for the 1949 season by the Oregon state semi-pro baseball league.

Salem, Albany and Bend will be joined in the league this year by Eugene, Sweet Home and Silverton.

The league has drawn up a 20-game, 10-week schedule with openers billed for June 4. In the first games, Sweet Home plays at Bend, Eugene at Silverton, and Salem and Albany at either town depending on the Western International league slate.

## KENTUCKY FAVORED

New York, March 21 (AP)—Powerful Kentucky, opening defense of its N.C.A.A. basketball championship, was favored by 14 points over Villanova and Illinois in a 10-point choice over Yale in tonight's semi-finals of the eastern regional playoffs.

The survivors of the semi-finals will meet tomorrow night for the eastern title and the right to meet Oklahoma A & M for the national championship at Seattle, Wash., March 25. The Aggies won the western playoffs by beating Oregon State 55 to 30, Saturday night at Kansas City.
