

Motor Concerns Report Spring Business Upturn

Detroit, April 13 (UP)—The small or independent automobile makers reported today that the spring spurt in sales is gaining speed as warmer weather approaches.

On the other hand, the "big three" companies said demand for their cars has been strong all along and that any current seasonal trend is being felt largely by their little rivals.

Hudson, Packard, Nash and Studebaker reported that business is at near record highs, and Kaiser-Frazer, which was in sales troubles only a few weeks ago, said retail deliveries increased 89 per cent in the first 10 days of April compared with the first 10 days of March.

Another independent, Willys-Overland, had little to report about the usual upsurge in sales during the spring, but the company announced recently that production had been cut back in April from five days to four. Output dropped below the usual 2,000 units weekly.

Deliveries Higher
Hudson said deliveries surged upward to 14,876 in March for the highest volume for that month since 1929. First quarter, 1949, business is 38 per cent ahead of the period last year.

Kaiser-Frazer reported a current production rate of 325 to 340 cars daily and said it would increase to around 400. The company said sales have responded to a recent price cut.

Packard said a new delivery peak was set in March and that another sharp climb is expected for new models which go into production this week.

Studebaker reported it will hire 700 more employees in the next 10 days to join the production battle at South Bend and to build up the weekly rate from the current 4,620 mark to 5,020 cars.

Nash said a 20-year high was set in auto deliveries during March and sales were 40.1 per cent above February.

London, April 13 (UP)—Striking members of the transport and general workers union voted today to go back to work on the London docks tomorrow in response to appeals by union leaders.

Members of the national amalgamated union of stevedores and dockers, who started the strike Monday, voted to continue its pending talks at the ministry of labor later today.

The decision of the TGWU members indicated that work on some of the 100 ships tied up by the strike will begin tomorrow. This group joined the strike Monday.

Chrysler said that its Plymouth, Dodge and DeSoto and Chrysler car dealers are asking for stepped up production and more deliveries to meet "a very strong market."

They were sons of Mr. and Mrs. Chester Koch, farmers of near Marshall, Mo.

Koch called Dr. Earl C. Macey, Marshall physician, yesterday to report that the stork was on its way. Then he rushed Mrs. Koch to the physician's home.

Macey bundled them all in his car and started the trip to Sedalia. En route, the physician was forced to stop and turn the driving chore over to the prospective father.

The first baby was born only 11 miles from home. Twelve minutes later, his two brothers had arrived.

Koch, 40, and his 41-year-old wife already were parents of two boys and a girl. Two-year-old Chester, Jr., was born in a taxicab. Five-year-old Linda Faye arrived before the doctor could get there.

Mrs. Koch and the triplets, as yet unnamed, were reported "doing nicely."

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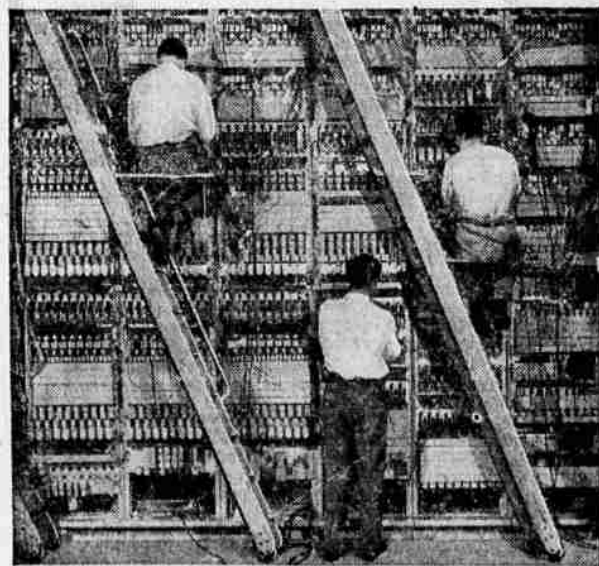
