

ACA to Assist Land Clearing In This Region

Payments to help defray the cost of clearing sage brush land for the establishment of permanent pastures are now available to all farmers in Deschutes county through the local Agricultural Conservation Association, according to Chairman H. P. Eby.

Assistance payment for this practice in the past has been limited only to range operators who owned or rented 640 acres or more of dry grazing land. However, the county committee feels that there is a large acreage of sage brush land on smaller farms in this county that will provide a considerable amount of economical pasture if the land is cleared and recommended pasture grasses and mixtures are established. Accordingly, at its last meeting the county ACA committee removed the 640 acre range land limitation and made the practice available to all farmers in the county.

The payment rates are 60 per cent of the cost of clearing, the total payment not to exceed an average of \$5 per acre or a total of \$500 per operator in any one year.

To be eligible for payment, farmers planning to clear sage land for pasture should apply for the practice at the agricultural conservation office before beginning the clearing.

In addition to aid in clearing the land, payments up to \$5 per acre are available to help defray the cost of sewing the new pasture.

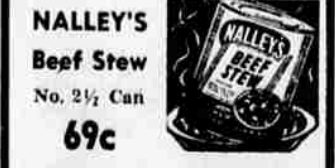
