

Endurance Race Planned as Part Of Roundup Event

Prineville, April 21—Plans have been launched by the Ridge Riders saddle club of Prineville to hold an endurance race from Sisters to Prineville on Sunday, August 14, as a highlight feature of the 1949 Crooked river roundup.

Jess Cain, manager of the roundup association, who states that a committee of that group has agreed to the staging of the race, provided the saddle club obtains a minimum of 10 entries, says that the finish of the race in front of the grandstand on the final Sunday afternoon will provide a thrill for those in attendance that day.

It is planned that all entries in the endurance race be present at the Saturday afternoon roundup performance and participate in the grand parade preceding the daily bucking and roping contests.

Earl Ferguson, president of the Ridge Riders, has begun contacting all riding clubs and other like organizations of the state in an effort to create interest in the event. It is expected the awards of \$500 and \$250 respectively for first and second places will draw entries of top endurance horses.

The course tentatively selected for the race will proceed from Sisters to Bend and thence country to Prineville. The route will be by dirt road, it is stated. The distance is around 50 miles.

Bock Brew Held Mere Tradition

St. Louis (UP)—The bock beer season is about over. If you like a steady diet of the stuff, now is the time to howl.

Bock brew to the industry is like turkey on Thanksgiving, or colored eggs on Easter.

"Pure tradition," said Edward J. Vogel, Jr., brewmaster of Griesedle Bros., one of the largest producers in this beer center. "If enough customers demanded it they'd get bock all year round."

What's bock beer? Simple, plain beer except the barley is roasted before use. Or if the brewery is on the slippery side it might put in a vegetable coloring instead. No reputable firm would do so.

Practical Beginning
Like all traditions, bock beer had a practical beginning. Before safe refrigeration, the brewmaster had to stop work in spring. His last batch was made with roasted barley so that during the summer its loss of color, through storage, would not make the brew look like water before he could get another batch together in the fall.

When the dark beer came out in spring, the customers thought they were getting something special.

The only mystery about bock beer today is the origin of the name. Vogel believes it was started by two Bavarian brewmasters several centuries ago.

For an obscure reason to get tipsy on another brewmaster's batch was a social disgrace at that time.

Blamed the Goat
Otto laughed. Heinrich, red-faced, pointed to the goat. "It's not the beer, it's the bock."

That's why the buck goat stares at you from beer advertisements in the spring.

If you like bock demand it the year round, Vogel says. You'll get it. But that would be like eating colored hard-boiled eggs on Christmas morning.

Vogel, a leader in the post-war resurgence of bock beer, thinks America and the industry should hold on to its traditions.
