Carpenters Sign Up for Project At Prineville

Prineville, April 21—At the insistence of Wallace T. Bird, business agent of the local carpenters' union, A. F. of L., all carpenters who will seek work on the Pioneer Memorial hospital building, on which ground will be broken Saturday, were registered Tuesday with the Prineville sub-office of the Bend state employment service office.

Bird said that the employment service, if conditions warrant, plans a full-time office here this summer. In addition to the labor demands of lumber and logging companies, the reconstruction of the Ochoco irrigation dam will utilize a large number of men soon. Bids on this project, for which congress has appropriated \$350,000 for a first unit, will be opened at the Bend office of the U. S. bureau of reclamation on May 3.
