**ABANDONED WELL CAPPED**  
Spokane, Wash., April 21 (UP)—An abandoned well, 43 feet deep, was capped today because a California couple "couldn't sleep" knowing it was uncovered. Sheriff Ralph M. Smith said Mr. and Mrs. E. J. Fryviller mailed a map from their home in Bell Garden, Cal., showing the location of the abandoned well they discovered years ago while living at Opportunity, Wash., near here. Deputies said the well was "extremely dangerous." It had an eight foot mouth and water could be seen at the bottom. No fence or covering protected it.

**CHILD FOUND ALIVE**  
Clairfield, Tenn., April 21 (UP)—A seven-year-old girl, lost in ravine-laced mountain country since Tuesday night, was found alive and "in good condition" today by a search party of coal miners. Blue-eyed Wanda Moore was discovered by Hubert Parrott and Kenney Huddleston, two coal miners employed by the company where the child's father worked. The mining company had ceased all operations to permit workers to join in the search. A posse of over 1,000 miners and mountaineers had scoured the mountain country, using bloodhounds, since the little girl was first reported missing on Tuesday afternoon.
