

Eisler Escape Ship May Become Center of Probe

Washington, June 10 (UP)—Rep. Richard M. Nixon, R., Calif., today called for a full-scale congressional investigation of the operations of the Gerhart Eisler escape ship Batory.

Nixon, a member of the house un-American activities committee, said "our investigations seem to me to indicate that the Batory has been used by more than one communist to escape from this country."

"The matter should be gone into thoroughly by the un-American activities committee," he said.

Nixon's statement came after a witness had told the committee he was sold a ticket on the Polish liner even though he did not have a passport. He said that Mrs. Carol King, Eisler's attorney, told him a passport was unnecessary.

The testimony was given by Phillip O. Keeney, unemployed librarian who once worked for Gen. Douglas MacArthur in Japan. Keeney said the state department refused to issue him a passport that would permit him to take a job in Czechoslovakia.

Keeney said he armed himself with a "certificate of identity" and attempted to board the Batory. Czech officials pronounced his credentials to be "in order" but American officials blocked his departure, he said.

Morse Predicts Compromise Law

Chicago, June 10 (UP)—Sen. Wayne L. Morse, R., Ore., predicts that a compromise labor law will be passed in this congress but neither management nor labor will approve it enthusiastically.

He warned a meeting of the steel founders' society, a group of steel casting manufacturers, that injunctions must be eliminated from the new national labor law, and that the Taft-Hartley law should be repealed.

"Organized labor will dig in for as many years as it takes to resist return to government by injunction," Morse said.

Morse called the provision for handling strikes affecting the public welfare in the Taft-Hartley act, "the silliest legal procedure in any federal law."

Inquest Ordered In Girl's Death

Portland, June 10 (UP)—A coroner's inquest was ordered today after the death of a 25-year-old waitress who reportedly plunged from a moving automobile into a gutter.

Police identified the woman as Mrs. Bertha Kludt, a waitress at the Jockey club.

Statements were taken by detectives from two men who were in the automobile—Floyd Olson, 24, and his twin brother, Lloyd.

Floyd Olson told detectives that they picked up Mrs. Kludt when she got off work and, after stopping at the Paragon club, were taking her home when she dived from the car.

"I made a grab for her when she opened the door and started to jump. Some of her clothing tore loose," he said.

The Olsons said they picked her up from the street and drove to Floyd's house where their mother and sister lived. A doctor suggested she be moved to a hospital and there she was pronounced dead.

Deserter Who Posed as Woman Given Sentence

Burtonwood, Eng., June 10 (UP)—A deserter from the U. S. army who hid behind his own skirts for three years by posing as the world's only woman fire eater was sentenced by an army court today to serve two years at hard labor.

A seven-man army court found Pvt. Delbert E. Hill guilty on a desertion charge, ordered the two-year sentence, and decreed a bad conduct discharge for the soldier who wowed 'em with his magic in British theaters.

Hill, 36, of Philadelphia, trod the boards of British music halls as Donna Delbert, woman fire eater. Besides gulping flaming torches—or so it seemed to the audiences—he would produce a cat or dog from an empty barrel or for variety cut paper or snuff a candle with a whip.

The soldier who donned feminine attire and let his hair grow was charged with deserting the army on July 3, 1945.

Pleading innocent, he told the court today that he merely went AWOL, because he had too much "latrine duty."

McCall Named By Governor

Portland, June 10 (UP)—Gov. Douglas McKay today said he had appointed Thomas Lawson McCall, radio station KEX newscaster, as his executive secretary.

Gov. McKay said he expected McCall to take over the duties of the \$6,000-a-year job July 1.

McCall, a University of Oregon journalism graduate, has been a reporter on the Bend Bulletin, Daily Idahonian, Moscow, Ida., and the Portland Oregonian.

He served in wartime as an enlisted navy combat correspondent.

Jake Bird Places Another 'Hex'

Walla Walla, Wash., June 10 (UP)—Jake Bird, 47-year-old convicted ax-slayer, now under his fourth sentence of execution, sat in the death row today, waiting for his seventh "hex" to strike.

But, in Tacoma, his next "victim" wasn't worried.

Jim Taber, courthouse reporter for the Tacoma News-Tribune, was at work on time this morning. "I never felt better," he said.

"Besides I have all the protection I need. When I was stationed in New Guinea, I picked up a witch doctor's mask. Last night I put it above my bed, and it's pointing towards Walla Walla."

Bird placed the hex, which has successfully struck six of the prosecuting staff of his murder trial, after hearing Pierce county Judge Hugh J. Rossini set his date of execution for July 15.

The eloquent Negro murderer, whose legal bag of tricks three times has won him stays from the gallows steps, sported a new grey hat at his sentencing yesterday. A reporter at the court asked him where he got the hat.

"It's none of your business," snapped Bird, chewing sardonically on a stub cigar.

Reporter, This Time

Taber then asked the convicted murderer if he wanted to say anything "because you haven't got long to live."

"You ain't gonna live so long yourself," Bird replied.

Six persons connected with Bird's prosecution for the slaying of Mrs. Bertha Kludt, Tacoma, Wash., more than 18 months ago, have died unexpectedly since hearing the Negro say:

"You'll get to the pearly gates before I arrive there."

Bird sent the nation's police departments scurrying to their archives when he admitted 29 murders and intimate knowledge of an additional 14. That won him his first stay of execution when ex-Gov. Mon C. Wallgren signed an order at the request of the governor of Illinois.

The second respite from the 13 steps came when Supreme court justice William O. Douglas reviewed the case.

The third, and most dramatic, came last week when the San Francisco ninth court of circuit appeals ordered a stay only 12 hours before Jake was due to face the black-hooded hangman.

Bird, usually voluble and cheerful, yesterday was subdued and irritable. It appeared that his legal trickery was at an end.
