

Yanks in Garb Of '76 Will Invade England

Hartford, Conn. (U.P.)—Sometime next year, plane and boatloads of Colonial musket men will give the English countryside a chance to see what Cornwallis and his red coats were up against 175 years ago.

But this time, the soldiers' muskets won't be loaded or their swords drawn. Instead, some 2,000 representatives of Revolutionary units, garbed in their reds and blues and plumed hats, will arrive as ambassadors of good will and to return favors captured from the British at the battles of Lexington, Concord and Bunker Hill.

At the head of the "invasion" will be Col. Sam E. Lockrell of the Putnam Militia of Connecticut, wearing his late-18th-century uniform and carrying a sword. He will be accompanied by representatives of the Ancient and Honorable Artillery Company of Boston, the oldest military group in this country, the historic Lexington minute men, the Middlesex Militia and other groups of the 18th century.

All units will carry the flag of the original 13 colonies in addition to their command colors, and there will be a big brass band. The Phalanx band will be complete and may be augmented with instruments and musicians from other units.
