

Radio 'Diviner' Unearths Metal, Other Material

Paris (UP)—Jules Calte, a radio diviner, and an inventor, Andre Coatrieux, claim they have perfected a process of discovering metals and even lost persons with the help of mysterious "radio waves."

Using Calte's divining properties, which are "controlled" by a kind of Geiger counter invented by Coatrieux, the pair claim to have helped Paris police discover a body last March.

Police, they said, had given up all hope after a vain search of two months, but the team, using the machine which works by short waves, found the body without any trouble.

"Every metal and every person, living or dead, sends out short waves of different lengths," Coatrieux said.

"Personal wave lengths are as individual as fingerprints. The only problem is to know how to receive them. We have not solved this problem," he said.

Coatrieux said the pair worked together to find water and metals, rather than bodies.

How It Works

"Here is how we work," he said. "We limit the region of our search through the efforts of Calte, using a ring or a watch. Then, with my electric counter, which has an antenna and earphones, I wait for an interruption of the low hum which shows the presence of the object. Each metal, gold, silver, copper, must have a special machine keyed to its waves."

He said he thought once he had struck gold, but on digging, found a body with gold teeth.

In looking for water, he said, the low buzz was interrupted by a zzzzzzz sound like a mosquito if there was water, and a whistling sound if he was near a cave without water.

Coatrieux said his process was very similar to radar.

"Eventually I hope to develop it for diagnosing disease," he said. "We surely can invent a machine keyed to the waves of microbes or cancerous cells, for example."

Tricky Safe Invented

Calte and Coatrieux already have invented a practical application of "personalized waves."

"They have constructed a safe which opens automatically by a counter device when the owner approaches it. The owner wears a "sending apparatus" on his arm, keyed to his own personal wave length, and nobody else can open the safe.

And if the person dies? "One would have to blow the safe up," Coatrieux said.

Coatrieux, who works with scientific X-ray, radio and television equipment for a living, said he and Calte were planning a trip through France's Vendee region this summer.

"During the battle between French royalists and the Bretons in 1795, Royalists were rumored to have used bullets made of gold and silver," he said. "They also were supposed to have gold medals for identity. We also think there may be some gold veins there, but very slight. Our trip should prove very interesting."

Japanese Groups Dislike Neutrality in Politics

Tokyo (UP)—Gen. Douglas MacArthur speaks of Japan becoming the "Switzerland of the Pacific," but a great many Japanese still aren't convinced the idea will work.

Most Japanese agree that it would be nice for Japan to remain neutral and to keep out of future wars, but they can't bring themselves to believe that belligerent nations would just let Japan sit here.

In the first place, the Japanese feel Japan is too important to try to maintain such a neutral role. They think too many other nations would like to move in and take over their industrial machine, which is the best in the Far East.

In the second place, quite a few Japanese would like to have the opportunity of hooking up with a winning team and quickly rejoining one of the other camps in the various families of nations. They see the east-west cold war and figure they eventually will have to take sides. Acting as allies of

the victors would make the world forget a lot of recent Japanese history.

The question of "alliance or neutrality?" is a hot one here these days. It is debated in the newspapers, in trams and in the newly re-opened beer halls.

Even in the halls of the national diet, representatives of the people fire pointed questions at the premier on the subject and demand a clarification of the government's position.

Right now, of course, the government's position doesn't matter. Japan is occupied and the government has no foreign relations policy. Today Japan has no control over her foreign policy and is permitted no direct contact with other governments.

But the question is a big one and it eventually will have to be solved.

Premier Shigeru Yoshida's opinion is that perpetual neutrality is extremely difficult, if not impossible, for any nation to maintain. His expressed views indicate he believes that Japan will need alliances in the future—

especially alliances to protect this nation, which is disarmed and which is pledged to live without an army or navy.

On the other hand, there are factions here which believe Japan should avoid any entangling alliances and must observe perpetual and strict neutrality at whatever the cost.

Japan's old veteran statesman, Kijuro Shidehara, a former premier, is one of the leaders of this group. He believes alignment with any nation, group or international pact, such as nations in a Pacific pact, would be bound to invite the enmity of rivals or rival groups and would afford a pretext for attacks on Japan.

Few Japanese have the courage to speak in the open against the idea of neutrality advocated by Gen. MacArthur. But the debates are going on in all walks of life as the Japanese attempt to formulate a plan for their national life in the future.

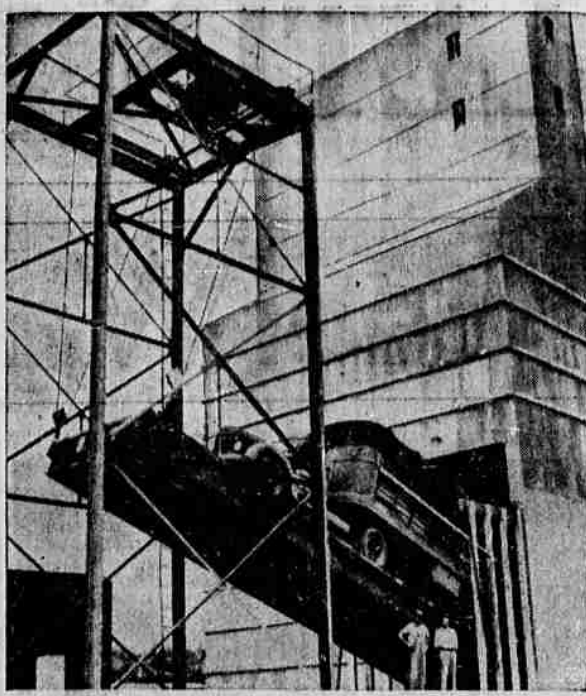
