All-Star Clash Sorry Exhibit; May Be Last One

New York, July 13 (UP)—If the major league club owners are looking for an excuse to abandon the annual all-star game, as is often reported—they had their chance to do it today.

For in the sorry sunset of the American league's 11 to 7 victory over the National league at Ebbets Field in what was easily the worst of the 16 mid-season classics ever played, there were very definite excuses for cutting the whole thing out.

This might be a handy stopping point because the game which got its start as a sort of added attraction to the 1933 Chicago world's fair, now has completed its cycle of major league parks—a cycle which permitted all the fans in big league territory to see their chosen stars in action.

No Credit to Players
In addition to that, the last of the 16 games was something that reflected no credit upon the players who were supposed to be the best in the business. The National leaguers fumbled as if in a sandlot game.

Never before has a team committed as many errors in a single all-star game... the previous high of four bobbles being set by the American league at Cincinnati in 1938.

Some of the players themselves didn't seem interested enough to hustle, although the old pros like Joe DiMaggio, Ted Williams, Stan Musial, and Jackie Robinson gave their all... all the way. But what bothered them and the rest of the fifty—25 players on each side who are chosen for the game—was that even the fans were a little bored.

When it rained briefly in the sixth inning, many of the 32,577 fans who ducked for shelter found their dry quarters more pleasant than the seats they had paid up to \$5 to park in, and they didn't come back.

Marlowe Beaten In Tournament

Los Angeles, July 13 (UP)—Harry Gurley, an approach and putting artist from Denver, faced Donald D. Shock of Dayton, O., today in a feature match of the third round of the National public links golf tournament.

Gurley turned in a sparkling exhibition yesterday in defeating lanky Tom Marlowe of Portland, Ore., 3 and 2. Marlowe captured the attention of the gallery Monday when he upset defending champion Mike Ferrentz of Long Beach, Cal., 5 and 5, with his blazing putter.

Marlowe played an on and off game yesterday dropping clear out of the match when Gurley calmly chipped in from 60 feet out on the 14th green and sank a 15-foot putt on the 16th.

Larry Bouchey of Los Angeles, who edged out Frank Rutkiewicz of Honolulu on the 19th hole yesterday, meets Paul MacDonald of Benton, Wash. MacDonald topped Miles Falls, of Detroit, 3 and 2 in the second round.

Angels Have Top League Pitcher

San Francisco, July 13 (UP)—The Los Angeles Angels may be at the bottom of the Pacific Coast league standings but they have the top pitcher in the league averages.

Booker T. "Cannonball" McDaniels, the recruit from the Kansas City Monarchs who joined the Angels in mid-June, has won five games and lost one to top the hurlers in the triple A circuit with a .833 average.

Close behind him is another newcomer, Forrest Thompson, of the Oakland Oaks, who has won four and lost one for .800. The two ace righthanders of the Hollywood Stars' mound staff, Willard Ramsdell and Gordon Maltzberger, are in third and fourth slots. Ramsdell has a 11-3 record and Maltzberger stands at 12-4.

Sacramento Makes Big Leap From Second Division by Taking Series From Rainiers

San Francisco, July 13 (UP)—Two baseball figures over in the city of Sacramento are reportedly about the happiest individuals connected with the Pacific Coast league today.

The two gentlemen, namely, are Solon vice-president George Glumpp and Manager Del Baker, whose surprising Sacramento ball club leaped from the second division into second place within a week. The Sacs did this leap-frogging stunt by pushing over the Seattle Rainiers in six straight sets of triple-A ball in the recent northland series.

Yesterday Klumpp had nothing but praise for Manager Baker. Speaking of the Sacs pilot as "great," he added, "I think we're going to do all right the rest of the season... the team is winning now."

More Seats Needed
The elated Klumpp wished he "had about three or four thousand more seats," for tonight's tussle with the league leading Hollywood Stars. But he was a little cautious about whether the Solons could trim that 10 game bulge the Stars possess.—"I'm like Baker, let's wait and see what happens," he said.

Less on the elated side was Manager Jo Jo White of the skidding Seattle Rainiers, who survived a board of director's meeting yesterday and who will be at the helm when the club engages the San Francisco Seals tonight. Whether he can pull his club by the not-too-glamorous O'Doullans remains to be seen.

The Seals ended up on the short end of a 4-2 series with Hollywood and currently are fast setting one of the worst records since 1911, and that's a few years in any book.

Oaks Floundering
The Oakland Oaks, who have floundered through numerous lineup changes, trades and sales, open a six-game series with San Diego in the Padre park. Oakland managed to handle the Los Angeles Angels, 4-2 in a bay city series while the Padres were bowing to Portland three games to four. The Oaks maintain a slim half-game lead over the fourth-place Padres.

The Portland Beavers traveled south yesterday and will open with the Angels tonight in the other game. The Beavers, in sixth place after a long early season wallow in the cellar, have secured a three and a half game lead over the seventh place Seals and trail Seattle by the same number.

Junior Softball Needs Players
The Jaycee committee in charge of the junior softball league announced today that more players are needed to fill the rosters of the teams which are scheduled to play tonight.

All youths, 15 years of age and under, are eligible to play in the junior league. Boys in that age category, who are interested in playing, are urged to be at the ball diamond at 6 p.m. today.

Prineville Nine To Battle Elks

The Prineville team that is to face the Bend Elks here Thursday evening at 8:30, under the lights of the municipal field, is recognized as one of the strongest clubs in upstate Oregon, with a record of 10 won and 3 lost. Bud Russell, manager of the Elks, pointed out today. Victories include a win over the Kercher Lumber Co. of Portland, team that won two out of three games from the Elks here over the Fourth of July holidays.

The Prineville squad has been dickered for a game with the neighboring Elks all season and the Crook county squad will be accompanied here by a large group of loyal fans, according to information received by Russell. Prineville fans have even hinted that the Elks have been a bit reluctant to schedule the Crook county club. "We just didn't have an opening until now, and in order to accommodate the Prineville boys we had to make arrangements for the mid-week contest," Russell said.

4 Pitchers
Prineville has four pitchers, with Ben Cook, a home-town hurler, hailed as the "strong man." Cook has a season record of 5-1. Mike Hannigan, a senior from Boston college, is another of Prineville's top pitchers. He has a season record of 2-0.

Six members of the Prineville club are batting over .400, and the team average is .306.

Harry Givan Leads Golf Qualifiers

Seattle, July 13 (UP)—Harry Givan, former Walker cup ace of Seattle's Broadmoor Golf club, today held the 1949 Pacific Northwest Golf association's championship medal crown with a 136-stroke total—just one stroke short of the all-time record.

Givan's record-shattering 66 Monday combined with a three-under-par 70 yesterday was six strokes better than runner-ups Eli Barileau, California state amateur king, and Jack Westland, Everett, Wash., who tied at 142.

Defending champion Glenn Sheriff of the Olympic View Golf club, Seattle, was number two qualifier. He automatically receives the right to defend his title.

Close to the leaders were Harold Gjelmie, Broadmoor sharp shooter, and Tom Boucher of Seattle's Jackson park. They both fired 143's.

In the 145 bracket were Johnny Dawson, 1949 Walker cup selection from California; Bill Mahoney, Canadian junior champion from Vancouver; Bruce McCormick, California's second 1949 Walker cup player, and Dr. Jack Bean of San Francisco, who claims he is a better dentist than golfer.

Thirty golfers have so far qualified for the play with only two positions remaining to be determined.

Bend Merchants Play Evans Fly

The Evans Fly Co. softball team, the nine which seems to put the hex on Bend softball league leaders, will be matched tonight in a game with the Bend Merchants, a team with an indifferent record, but one which manages to throw a scare into the better rated teams, and sometimes turn in an upset.

Evans Fly, the heavy favorite, boasts a season's record of seven wins and six losses, compared to three wins and nine losses for the Merchants.

In the second scheduled game tonight in the senior league, the Redmond Vets, who Monday went into a first place tie with Childs Hardware, will meet All State Realty, a fourth place team. All State has been the hot and cold team of the league this season. It has won some of the games it was favored to lose and has lost some of the games it was favored to win.

The Vets will be the favorites tonight with a record of 10 wins against three losses, compared to the Realty record of five wins and seven losses.

Preceding the two senior league games tonight will be the second junior league game of the season. The game, to begin at 6:15 o'clock will match Gregg's Banner Bread with Capitol Cleaners.
