

Medford Comes From Behind To Win 10-Inning Baseball Game From Bend Elks Team

The Medford Craters snatched a win from the Bend Elks, when they came from behind in the ninth inning of a game played last night at the municipal ball park to tie the score 4-4, and then went on to win 5-4 in the tenth frame on a one run rally.

Paul Gehrman started on the mound for the Elks and held the heavy hitting Craters to seven hits and two runs, one of which was a long high homer over the left field wall by center fielder Pat Patterson.

Gehrman drove in two of Bend's four runs when he doubled with the bases loaded in the second inning. He was relieved in the seventh inning by Bill Austin, a southpaw transfer from Brownsville.

Bend Gets 5 Hits
The Medford hurler, LaVerre Herrmann, pitched a brilliant ball game as he allowed the Bend batters only five hits in the 10 inning tilt. Three of the Elks hits were made in the first two innings of play.

Farrell led the Bend batters with a record of two for five. He banged out the only Bend home run.

The two Bend pitchers yielded nine hits to the Craters and struck out 10, six for Gehrman and four for Austin.

Tonight the two teams will meet in another game at municipal ball park. "Old Reliable" Jim Farmer is slated for mound duty. The game will begin at 8:30 p.m.

Coast League Pitchers Get 3 Shutouts

San Francisco, July 21 (AP)—Youthful Hal Saltzman, experienced Ken Holcombe and journeyman Lou Tost all came up with pitching beauties in the Pacific Coast league last night.

The three hurlers tossed almost identical games, each shutting out the opposition, and each allowing but three hits. Their combined efforts represented the best night pitchers have had in the loop this year.

Taking them in order of seniority, Tost pitched the Oakland Oaks to a 3-0 win over the San Francisco Seals; Holcombe blanked the San Diego Padres to give Sacramento a 4-0 win; and Saltzman and his Portland Beavers whitewashed Seattle 3-0.

The first game of the Los Angeles-Hollywood double-header was also a pitching battle with the Stars winning out 3-2 in eight innings. Not so the second game. The nightcap was a wild affair that saw eight hurlers in action and also saw the surprising Angels clout the Twinks 10-5.

Hurlers' Duel
Tost almost had to pitch a three-hitter to get a win from Al Lien as the Acorns and the Seals put on their third straight hurlers' duel. Lien and his reliever Cliff Melton, limited the Oaks to five batters, but one of them was a two run homer by Mel Duezabou in the second inning. Melton was seeing his first action since April 8 when he broke his foot in a game with Seattle.

The Sacramento Solons made it 13 wins out of the last 15 games as they got to the Padres' Al Jurisich for eight hits and four runs. Holcombe needed only the two runs the Seals furnished him in the opening frame as he kept the Padres away from the plate for the entire distance. It was Holcombe's 13th win of the campaign.

Saltzman, who used to belong to the Seattle Rainiers, gained a bit of revenge by shelling the team that let him go. The Beavers spotted the young University of Oregon athlete a single run in the opening inning and then got two more in the ninth off reliever Herb Karpel.
