

Oakland Acorns Win Game But Still Unhappy Over Failure to Gain Shutout

San Francisco, July 27.—(AP) The Oakland Acorns won a Pacific Coast league game 4-1 last night but there was no joy in Emeryville.

Most of the fans went home disappointed, all because of outfielder Al Lyons of Seattle who spoiled Earl Jones' no-hit, no-run ball game with a ninth inning homer.

Jones, a quiet-spoken, left-handed twirler from Fresno, stood the Sud batters on end until the fatal ninth. After Jones retired Rainier first baseman Heinz Becker, Lyons connected with an outside pitch which sailed into the right-center field bleachers.

The victory gave Jones his seventh win against five defeats for the season.

Jackie Jensen started the Oakland scoring with his sixth homer of the year with one on Artie Wilson, currently holding the league swat crown, chased the other two runs in with a single.

Solons Win The Sacramento Solons had to stretch for a 147 win over the Los Angeles Angels.

The rumpaging Portland Beavers gnawed away at the Holy wood lead a little more last night, taking the league leaders into camp 2-1.

The Stars went into a quick 10 lead when Jo Jo White scored on a long fly ball hit by Herb Gorman in the first inning.

Padres Lose Jim Gladd drew a walk and worked his way to second on a sacrifice. Luis Marquez drove him in with a scorching liner that bounced off third baseman Jim Haxes' glove.

San Francisco outlasted the San Diego Padres 4-3 in ten innings at the southern city. Dario Lodigiani ended the tilt with a homer after the Padres had tied the game up in the eighth on consecutive singles by Orestes Minoso, Max West, and Harvey Storry.

The top half of the eighth Walt Judnich put the Seals back in the game with a homer.

Channel Swim Attempt Fails

Dover, England, July 27.—(AP) Mrs. Willi Croes Van Rijssel, 39, a buxom Dutch housewife, was in exhausted condition today after failing by one mile and a half to swim the 19-mile wide English channel.

The nude, grease-plastered channel hopeful was pulled into a boat accompanying her cross-channel at 10:25 p.m. last night. She was found to be suffering from cold and exhaustion, having been in the water for 14 hours and 16 minutes, 23 minutes less than it took American Gertrude Ederle to complete the journey in 1926.

Mrs. Van Rijssel, who hoped to crack the 23-year-old mark established by Miss Ederle, was forced to quit when she ran into extremely heavy seas within sight of Dover.

She was plunged into a hot bath and fell into bed, too exhausted to talk to reporters.

Mrs. Rijssel followed the same course Miss Ederle took in August, 1926, when she set the record of 14 hours and 39 minutes.

The Dutch swimmer's failure was the second marked up this season.

Philip Mickham, 18, an English schoolboy, spent 13 hours in the water last Sunday but was forced to quit seven miles off the English coast.

Sometime in August, Shirley Mae France, 16, of South Somerset, Mass., will attempt to do what Mrs. Rijssel couldn't. Shirley now is en route to Europe on the liner Nieu Amsterdam.

Cardinals Show Hitting Power In Latest Win

By Stan Optowsky (United Press Sports Writer) New York, July 27.—(AP) The St. Louis Cardinals added plate power to their pitching prowess today as they stretched their National league lead to a game and a half over the faltering Brooklyn Dodgers.

The Card mound corps has often been cited as the team's grasp on glory, supposedly a fine antidote for a so-so batting attack. But last night, when the St. Louisers rapped out 16 hits to beat the Philadelphia Phillies, 9 to 5, they showed power unexcelled.

The Dodgers, meanwhile, were dropping their fourth in a row, this to the Cubs by a 6 to 0 count.

No Flash in Pan Those 16 hits against the Phils represented no flash in the pan. The Cards have been hitting regularly of late. They got 16 blows in one game against Brooklyn and a respectable eight in each of the other two.

Red Schoendienst with four for five, and Stan Musial, Glenn Nelson and Enos Slaughter with three for four, headed the luster attack on four Philly pitchers last night. Musial had two doubles in his collection.

For the Dodgers it was a case of their old jinx, Johnny Schmitz, once again. Schmitz scattered seven hits while the Cubs punned three Dodger pitchers—par for the Brooklyn course—with 11 including five extra basers.

The Pirates needed only four hits to beat the Giants, 4 to 1. Kent Peterson's six-hit pitching gave the Reds a 6 to 3 win over the Braves.

Yanks Idle Both the leading Yankees and the chasing Indians were idle in the American league race, but they go at it today with Bob Feller opposing Ed Lopat.

The Red Sox cut loose with 10 runs in the eighth inning to swamp the White Sox, 11 to 2. It was more of the same for Washington. The Senators dropped their 11th straight, this to Detroit by a 6 to 2 score.

At Philadelphia Sam Chapman's single with two on and two out in the 10th gave the Athletics a 5 to 4 decision over the Browns.
